A .- For best results manure Sunday in the Oak Grove section should be applied during the fall with Mr. and Mrs. Alex Randall. and winter and either turned under at the fall plowing or disced in dur- turned from Hopewell, Va. ing early spring. If applied at all during the spring or summer it should be in a well-rotted condition. On average soils the rate of application should be ten two-horse wagon loads to the acre. When applied


