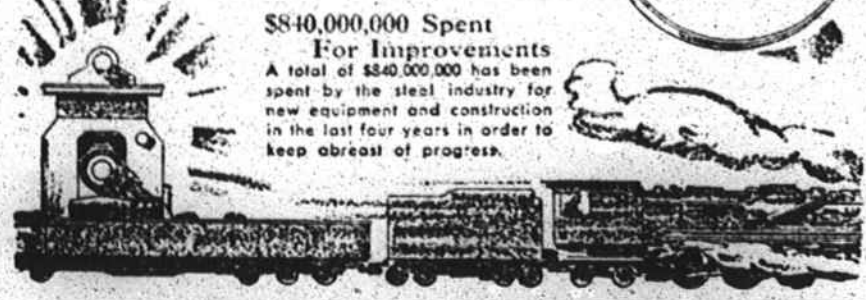
It Takes Light To Make Steel

Farm Questions Answered

Q.—How can I cure my calves of indigestion or scours?

A.—This trouble is usually caused by improper feeding out of dry pails or boxes and can be prevented much easier than it can be cured. The calf should be isolated and its milk feed reduced at least one-half as soon as the first symptoms appear. Legume hay should be replaced by grass hay. The animal should then be given a dose of castor oil and, following the action of the oil a teaspoonful of a mixture composed of one part salol and two parts each of subnitrate of bismuth and bicarbonate of soda should be given. This dosage can be repeated at about six hour intervals until the diarrhea is stopped.

Q.—What are the symptoms of worm infestation in poultry?

A.—The general symptoms are unthriftiness and subnormal weight. However, an autopsy is the only sure method of determination and this should be made on several birds. If the flock is infested to a great degree and the specie of worm determined, the treatment as recommended in Extension Circular No. 160 should be given. Rigid sanitation should also be practiced at all times. The circular mentioned may be secured free upon application to the Agricultural Editor at State College.

Q.—What distance between rows and hills gives best results in peanut production?

A.—The Runner varieties should be planted in 36 inch rows with the hills 12 inches apart. For the bunch varieties the rows may be a little closer together with the hills spaced every eight inches. Two seed should be put to the hill with all plantings. From 25 to 50 percent of all acreage each year is either too thin or irregular and for this reason the plantings should be made on a slight ridge. Good stands are also secured by planting when the ground is fairly dry.

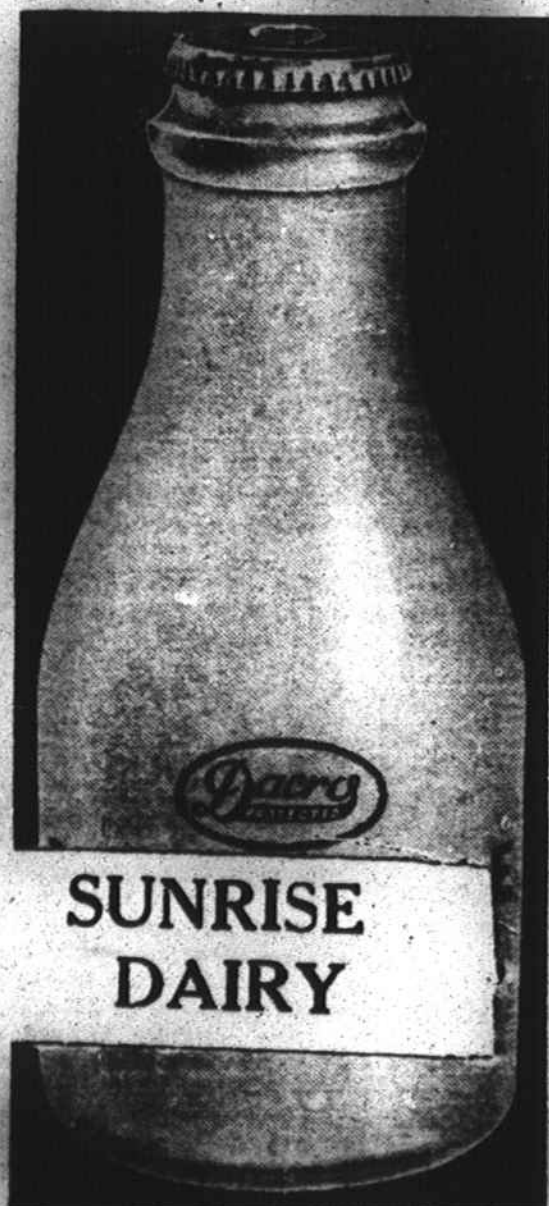
