**Auto Makers Shoot For Industry High**

Detroit, July 26.—(IPS).—The automobile industry is shooting for a new goal. It believes that 37,000,000 automobiles can be built and sold by 1960 in this country.

Attainment of this goal would mean, on the basis of the present population, that at least one in every three persons would own an automobile, compared with today's average of one for every five persons.

What the car of 1960 will be like is, of course, speculative, but manufacturers call attention to the change in cars in recent years and let the speculators use that contrast as a basis for future prospects. For instance:

Seventeen Ashe County sheep growers sold 125 lambs last week for \$825.65 net to the growers. The average net price for all grades in the pool was 8 1/4 cents a pound home weight.

New refinements and conveniences are, of course, continually in progress.
