Security Card Not **Enough Evidence To Cash** Unemployment Checks On

RALEIGH, Aug. 22.-A Social Se eurity card is not sufficient evidence of the identity of the holder to cause merchants or bankers to cash a bene fit check, Chairman Charles G. Powell, of the State Unemployment Com nission, warned recently. Normally, this method of identification is enough, but it should be tacked up with additional evidence of identity, if these is any question, Mr. Powell said.
