OLD FASHIONED CHOCOLATE LAYER CAKE

1 1/2 cup Spry 2 cups sifted flour (cake flour)
 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon vanilla (preferred)
 1 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 2 eggs, unbeaten 1/4 cup milk

Combine Spry, salt and vanilla. Add sugar gradually and cream until light and fluffy. (So quickly done with smooth, creamier Spry!) Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition.

Sift flour and baking powder together 3 times. Add small amounts of flour to creamed mixture, alternately with milk, beating after each addition until smooth. CHOCOLATE FROSTING

2 tablespoons Spry 1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
 1 tablespoon butter 1/4 teaspoon vanilla
 5 ounces chocolate 1/4 teaspoon salt
 5 tablespoons hot milk

Melt Spry, butter and chocolate together over hot water. Pour hot milk over sugar and stir until sugar is dissolved. Add vanilla and salt. Add chocolate mixture and beat until smooth and thick enough to spread. Makes enough to cover tops and sides of two 8-inch layers. (All measurements in these recipes are level)
