

Local Gridders Wallop Shelby's Lions 13-7

(INVADE CHARLOTTE TONIGHT)

Last Friday afternoon the "arch enemies of Cleveland" tangled in their annual battle and the Mountaineers emerged victors by the score of 13 to 7. The Mountaineers began their drive with the kick-off and marched down the field for their first touchdown in the early part of first period. They failed to make their extra point on that trial. The Lions retaliated in the early part of the second period, scoring on a pass from Archer to Legrand. They came into the lead by virtue of succeeding in their extra point trial. However, their leadership was short lived. The Mountaineers marched down the field for their second score a little later in the same period, made the extra and retained the lead. The Lions carried the first touchdown and the extra point after the last touchdown. Morrison carried the second touchdown. Legrand carried Shelby's six-pointer.

The Mountaineers tried few passes after Shelby intercepted one in the first period. A Lion also caught a Mountaineer pass in the third. The locals stuck closely to line plunges on which they gained most ground. Shelby's most successful mode of attack was passing on which the home team showed a weak defense.

Mountaineer line honors went to Harper, McDaniel and Bennett. All four of the backs (Nelsler, Gibson, Kominah and Morrison) were eligible for honors. Shelby's honors went to Richborough and Duncan respectively.

Tonight the Black and Gold Gridders invade Charlotte, playing Harding High in the Leon Stadium at eight o'clock. This game, originally scheduled for Friday night was changed because the stadium is being used on that date.

At this meeting reports were heard from the various activities: Camping, Advancement, Inter-Racial, Membership, Leadership Training, Finance, Civic Service, the Carolina Jubilee at Chapel Hill, Fire-Prevention Week and Safety.

A Scouting headquarters building is under construction in Gastonia. This building is to be three stories and is to cost \$23,000. PWA assistance has been secured and the sponsors part is just slightly over \$6,000. Most of this is being paid by Gastonia people but the privilege is being offered to others in the Piedmont Council to have a part.

It has been suggested that a contribution of \$50 be presented by Kings Mountain as our part. With a contribution of \$150 from Shelby of \$200 from Cleveland County.

The facilities of this building will be available for all Scouts throughout the Piedmont Council. Naturally these nearby will receive the greatest benefit. The contribution from those at greater distances is to give a token part because the building will be headquarters for the whole eleven counties making up the council.
