Lewis H. Brown Says Cooperation Is Needed

Cooperation Is Needed

OSTON, Nov. 5.—(IPS).—For the first time in six years the stage is set so that real cooperation is now possible between government and business leaders, Lewis H. Brown, president of Johns-Manville Corporation, told the annual New England Conference here.
"Not since the depression began is the need for such a program more vital than it is today," he said. As reasons why constructive ac-

tion is now possible, Mr. Brown cited:

Basic changes which have taken place in the last 25 years in the acceptance by business of new social responsibilities.

Encouraging signs of a new spirit of cooperation within the government itself.

"Carrying trade" is a term used in political economy and in commercial transactions to designate the commerce of different nations with each other.



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
