Loans For Building Show An Increase

The some loans of building, savings and loan associations of North Carolina for December, 1938, showed a decided increase over December of the previous year. It was announced by Martin F. Gaudin of Raleigh, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Building and Loan League. According to reports from members of the League, a total of \$1610,000 of loans were made by the associations during December, of which more than one-third, or a total of \$615,000 were for construction of new homes. \$330,000 were for the purchase of homes; \$160,000, for the repair and conditioning of homes and the balance of \$505,000 were for refinancing and other purposes.
The building, savings and loan associations of North Carolina made 1,075 loans during December, to help people construct, purchase or repair their homes. Advance reports from associations indicate that 1938 was one of the best years since 1929 and association secretaries are all very optimistic about the continuance of the extensive home building program being carried on throughout North Carolina.
