**Addition To St. Matthew's Lutheran Church**

The newly completed addition to Saint Matthew's Lutheran Church opened its doors last Sunday to become one of the most up to date Sunday School departments in Kings Mountain. The building consists of a basement floor and two upper floors, none of which are connected by stairs, and each serving a different and distinct purpose.

The basement will be used for Scout headquarters, at present for boys, and later, when a Girl Scout Troop is organized, for both. The Girl Scout troop will be organized within the near future, and will be headed by Miss Gussie Huffattler.

This floor contains a workshop for the boys, four patrol rooms, and a general meeting room. The floor is completed throughout with tiled walls, and an open fireplace to serve when the stoker is not in operation.

The ground floor of the building will be given over entirely to recreational purposes. It consists of a banquet and recreation hall, kitchen, lady's room, and the pastor's office and study. The lady's room, which has not been furnished, also contains an open fireplace as does the study. This room will be furnished by Mrs. D. C. Mauney who is donating the furniture.

Latest feature of the new department will be the Young Men's Bible Class, which is located on the upper floor of the building. This floor also contains a Men's class room, with 195 opera seats and two women's classes.

Rev. L. Boyd Hamm announced that the Young Men's Bible class, which was organized since the opening of the new building, already boasts a membership of twenty-eight. The room which this class occupies contains side-arm chairs for reaching the younger children's catechism. This is a distinct advantage over the old type seats, which provided nothing to supply the writing needs of the children.

The new building contains three bathrooms, two on the ground floor, and one on the upper.

The building was completed at a cost of approximately \$8,500. The building committee consisted of W. A. Ridenhour, chairman, W. E. Mauney, Arnold Kiser, J. E. Herridon and D. C. Mauney.

Two pianos will be installed in the addition, one of which will be donated by D. M. Baker and another by the Kiser family, relatives of the late Mrs. L. A. Kiser.

Rev. Mr. Hamm also announced that other projects now under consideration are the building of an outdoor furnace at the back of the church, to serve for picnics, venetian blinds for the ladies' room and the office, and an outdoor light for the picnic ground. A fountain has already been placed on the outside.

It was also announced that air conditioning for the old Lutheran building may be completed by Sunday evening, which is the date set for the Lutherans to have the Union Service.

**Try, Try Again**

Officials of the Kings Mountain School Band announced Tuesday that they will try again Friday evening at 6:30 o'clock to present the long awaited, oft rained out band drill. The drill, which was first scheduled for last Friday was rained out then. It was then arranged for Monday, and the weather man again used his influence to have it postponed.

Last Friday approximately 550 persons were left out in the cold, when the concert was called off at the last minute, with 116 cars parked within and without the ball park.

Friday afternoon will probably be the last attempt of the season to present the drill. The band will be inactive during August, resuming activity again with the beginning of the school year.

**Heavy Terms Are Imposed in Shelby Court**

Three Kings Mountain defendants, a white man and two negroes, were sentenced to 15 year terms in the state prison following trials in Clay and county superior court in Shelby yesterday.

Charlie Roberts, 34, who lives near Kings Mountain, drew 15 years for burglary, and Maybelle Robinson and Mose Russell, Kings Mountain negroes were sentenced for manslaughter.

Roberts, charged with first degree burglary, entered a plea of nolo contendere to second degree burglary. Solicitor L. S. Spurling accepted the plea, and Judge William H. Roberts imposed the sentence after hearing evidence. His sentence included instructions that the defendant be given a mental examination upon his arrival at prison.

Roberts entered the home of B. O. Starnes at the Phenix Mill on a night in May, it was testified. He stole some food, and departed with out his shoes, which he had removed. He was arrested later.

The Robinson and Russell negroes were accused of murder, and pleaded guilty to manslaughter in connection with the stabbing to death of David Thompson, negro, several weeks ago. Eunice Hopper, also indicted in the same case, entered a plea of nolo contendere. The judge continued prayer for judgement in her case until October.

Testimony indicated Thompson was killed during a quarrel which was preceded by drinking. The Robinson negroes was wielding the knife which actually killed Thompson during the fight, according to testimony.

The trial of B. A. Smith, Jr., a case in which considerable interest has been shown will be started today. Smith was arrested in connection with a fire which destroyed a store and burned to death William H. Blanton, 27, on April 16.

**Supt. Barnes Attends School Meet**

B. N. Barnes, superintendent of Kings Mountain School System left early this morning for Ridge Crest, where the North Carolina Schools Masters began their meet yesterday.

Mr. Barnes has been chosen to speak at the meeting on the subject: "How to Build Adequate Gymnasiums." He was chosen from all the schools in North Carolina because of the fine Physical Education program which Kings Mountain boasts. The meeting will be in session for three days.
