History Of The Kings Mountain Schools

 The building of the Southern Railway from Charlotte to Atlanta in 1870-1872 — passing through this particular locality, was the impetus for the founding of the Town of Kings Mountain.

Farmers who had been living in this section of Cleveland County prior to this time, had no vision of seeing their land turned into town lots or industrial sites, but men from other parts of this County and of North Carolina saw the possibilities for development and came with their families to found a town and establish a permanent home.

Children in the community created the necessity for a school and so about 1874 the first attempts to provide this necessity were made. Two families secured a tutor for their children and kindly permitted some neighbor children to share the instruction in their homes.

Probably about the same time a two-room building on the corner of Piedmont Avenue and King street was fitted up for a community school. Mr. Alex Aderheldt was the first teacher. Two years later, Capt. W. T. R. Bell selected Kings Mountain as the location of his military and high school which was the little town's pride and boast till 1866. Capt. Bell was a native of Virginia — a handsome man with a very winning personality. His school attracted many young men from this section of North and South Carolina and who in later years became prime movers in their respective fields of endeavor — and also afforded splendid educational advantages for the local youth—both boys and girls.

The citizens of the little town selected for him on this site, a two-story frame building which was enlarged by the addition of wings on either side. Perhaps some of you remember the old building — in the form of a cross with a high tower in front — painted white and trimmed in brown. This building served as the town school after the Bell school was discontinued and until 1910 when after repeated unsuccessful attempts it finally did succeed in burning to the ground.

Until 1905, the Kings Mountain School was financed on the tuition basis. Since that year it has been a graded school supported by public funds.

A long list of men and women have labored faithfully at the head of our educational system to bring it where it is today. Conditions were sometimes very unfavorable for making a success. The insufficiency of funds was usually a handicap — in the failing to provide equipment, teachers and many other necessities and requirements for a good school.

It was the usual situation to be without chalk and erasers, to be short on desks, with pupils sitting in straight chairs. Rarely was there a janitor, so pupils and teachers swept the floors, dusted and washed windows after school. If there were shades, curtains or pictures, the pupils took a collection to pay for them. On very cold days, school was dismissed, because the furnace wouldn't work or the fire hadn't been started early enough to warm the building.

In the very early days of the graded school the pupils were graduated from the seventh and eighth grades, but as the town and school grew, the ninth and tenth and finally the eleventh grades were added. In spite of all its hardships and shortcomings many of the students of the Kings Mountain Graded School were able to make good and creditable records in college.

In 1910 the first brick building was erected on this site. It contained 12 classrooms, several smaller rooms and an auditorium which was later turned into 4 additional classrooms.

Destroyed by fire in 1932, it gave place to the present three-story building completed in 1933. The auditorium and primary school were built in 1924 as an annex to the former brick building. The other units of our city school system are famil-

iar to all.
 In these later years, with the changed system of maintenance, Kings Mountain can truthfully and proudly claim a school system comparable to any in the state and superior to many in towns of equal size.

As a pupil, a teacher and a parent, it has been my privilege to grow up with the Kings Mountain School System since it became a public graded school. Remembering so distinctly the privations of the early days makes me the more deeply appreciative of the splendid facilities and advantages offered to the children who attend school in Kings Mountain today.

Teaching Personnel Above State Average

Kings Mountain has a teacher personnel to be proud of. In experience and training the teachers are above State average and above the average in many large systems.

There are 43 white teachers and principals, exclusive of the superintendent, in the Kings Mountain School System—5 men and 38 women. These teachers have had an average of 13 years experience in teaching with an average of 9 years in the Kings Mountain System.

The average training index of academic preparation of the teachers and principals is 4.56 years of college training or its equivalent. One principal and one teacher hold the Master of Arts degree and several other teachers have completed nearly enough work for the Masters Degree. There are 36 "A" certificates, 3 "B" certificates, 1 special proviso certificate, 2 principal's certificates, and 1 superintendent's certificate held by these teachers.

Kings Mountain teachers show a good professional spirit. They are enrolled and have had for several years one hundred per cent membership in the North Carolina Education Association. They have been very active in this work and have held, over a period of years, a number of important offices.

Our local teachers are definitely affiliated with the social, civic, and religious organizations of the city. Records show the church connections of the 43 teachers are as follows: Methodist 12; Presbyterian 11; Baptist 9; A. R. P. 6; and Lutheran 5.

Teachers are actively identified with the civic clubs of the city, with auxiliary agencies of the churches such as Sunday School, Missionary Societies, Young People's Organizations, various college alumni associations, with the American Legion Auxiliary, with Music Clubs, Garden Clubs, Book Clubs, Bridge Clubs and other organizations. Every teacher is enrolled in the Parent-Teacher Association and in Red Cross.

The colored teachers of Kings Mountain also rate high in professional training. There are ten teachers in the Davidson School — 4 men and 6 women. The principal holds a principal's certificate and all teachers hold the "A" certificate.
