BLIND WORKERS GET JOBS IN U. S. INDUSTRY

Morristown N. J., Nov. 20.—(IPS)—Even the handicapped are provided for in the countless millions of jobs produced by the American system of private enterprise, a survey here shows.

The survey was made of 400 blind men and women. It showed that 75 percent of them are either in full time jobs, running a household, or otherwise gainfully occupied.

Twenty percent were found to be salesmen; 18 percent stand operators; 8 percent hand industry workers; 7 percent home teachers; 5 percent proprietors and 13 percent students.
