Farmers Grateful For Rubber Tire Invention

Des Moines, Iowa Dec. 4.-(IPS) Development by the rubber indus east a stitlement autopoint a tire has resulted in time and money sav ugs for the farmer, a survey lowa farmers reveals.

Agricultural engineers of the lowa Agricultural Experiment Staon have recently completed a study of the use of rubber tires on the farm, and found the average farmer reporting a 23 percent sav ing in time and a 22 per cent saving in fuel by using rubber tires on his tractor.

Farm operations in 73 counties in the State were studied by the engineers. They found the farmer reporting higher tractor speeds, easier operation on hard-surfaced roads, less damage to farm roads, lanes, meadows and pastures; decreaseed tractor breakage and wear, and greater comfort.




