

Did It Speed Recovery?

In 1937 Congress enacted a law empowering a New Deal agency to fix minimum coal prices. Since then the agency has spent approximately \$3,000,000 a year. It has built up a payroll numbering some 1,400 persons. It has taken 12,000,000 words of testimony as a basis for its price determinations. It has examined two box cars full of exhibits on one kind or another. And no prices are expected to be announced before April 15, 1940 with the practical certainty that any announcement will provoke a storm of disapproval and protest from many coal operators and probably consumers generally. Did it speed recovery?
