The Gibsonville Club, with 42 members, made an outstanding record of community and individual achievements. The 24 girls and 18 boys in the club carried 64 projects, and every one of the members completed one or more projects.

Honorable mention was given the Beth-Ware Club in Cleveland County, which was the best club in 1939. The Elon Club in Alamance, the Copeland Club in Surry County, and the Black Creek Club in Wilson County.
