The style show will be held at 2:00 p. m. in Pullen hall on the campus. The young women will display and model a variety of costumes and wearing apparel which they have made as a part of their class room work in home economics, from fabrics designed and woven at State college by textile students.

The style show participants will represent the following colleges: Appalachian State Teachers college; Foothill college; Elon College; Flora Macdonald college; Red Springs; Greensboro college; Greensboro; Louisburg college, Louisburg; Meredith college, Raleigh; Peace Junior college, Raleigh; Queens college, Charlotte; St. Mary's school Raleigh.

WARE AND SONS BUILDING GRAIN ELEVATOR

The foundation has been dug, and concrete is being poured at Ware and Sons, in the construction of the company's latest step in better serving the farmers of the surrounding communities. The new construction is a grain elevator, Kings Mountain's first, which will take care of the farmers' surplus grains, namely corn, oats, and wheat.

The elevator, which will be a frame construction with a concrete basement, will have a capacity of approximately 5000 bushels, thus assuring nearby farmers of ample storage space for their grain crops.

The building, when complete, will be 32 by 60 feet, floor space, by 67 feet in height. It will contain twelve bins, having a capacity of approximately 4000 bushels each.

Two elevators, one for unloading grain, and the other for moving the grain around in the interior, will stand at the front. It will be equipped with a conveyor to carry the grains from the elevators to the separate bins, operated automatically, and another for carrying the grain into the mill.

Mr. W. A. Ware, interviewed by the Herald reporter, said that they hoped to have the elevator completed by the time of the harvest of the present wheat crop. Last season, he said, lack of storage space necessitated the shipment of at least 25 thousand bushels of grain to Charlotte. Storage space in the mill, at present, will accommodate only about 3000 bushels.

Mr. Ware said that in building the elevator they will now be able to handle the complete surplus of farmers in and around Kings Mountain. This will eliminate shipping costs on wheat and other grain raised in and around Kings Mountain.

The domestic wheat supply in 1940-41 is expected to total approximately 900,000,000 bushels, according to the U. S. Bureau of Agriculture Economics.
