CONTEST RULES

1. Any girl 16 to 25 years is eligible.
2. Nominations open Monday, July 22. Nominations close 6:00 P. M. July 29.
3. Method of receiving credit for votes:
 - (a) One nominating coupon will be credited to each girl accepting nomination, giving her 1000 votes.
 - (b) A credit of 10 votes will be given for each "Newspaper vote coupon" cast for a contestant.
 - (c) A credit of 1000 votes will be given for every "Advance Ticket Vote Coupon" cast for a contestant.

7. The contestant finishing in second place in Shelby or immediate vicinity shall have the title of "Miss 1940".
8. The next eight contestants from Shelby or immediate vicinity shall be Centennial Princesses to attend Miss Shelby.
9. The next eight contestants from Kings Mountain or immediate vicinity shall be Centennial Princesses to attend Miss Kings Mountain.

In the six-year period from 1924 to 1929 the cash income of producers from sales of cotton and cottonseed averaged \$1,537,000,000 annually. For the year ending July 31, 1939 it was \$629,459,000, or 40 percent of the pre-depression average.

Almost a billion dollars a year lost to the cotton farmer! Several times that amount of business lost annually to those depending in whole or in part upon the trade and commerce created by the cotton dollar!
