A pure stand of good Dallis grass sod has yielded only 1600 pounds of dry herbage per acre during the last two years in a test. A similar plat seeded to Dallis grass plus les pedeza produced an average yield of 2,900, pounds of forage during the same period. The addition of lespe deza increased the poundage of a carpet-grass pasture from 600 to 1,900 pounds, and Bermuda grass from 800 to 2000 pounds.

Lovvorn says that even more important than quantity is the quality of legume grass pastures. Grasses run very low in calcium during the summer and fall, and during these seasons the percentage has been doubled by the lespedera, he report

The agronomist advises the of lespedeza unless the soil is in a good state of fertility, in which case white clover will do good. Lespedeza can be grown anywhere in the State except on some of, the sandhill soils.


