

Tar Heels Joining Army

A total of 809 Tar Heels have been accepted for service with the United States Marine Corps, since the opening of the North Carolina District last October, through the District Headquarters Recruiting Station located in the Post Office Building at Raleigh, Sub-district Recruiting Station located in the Post Office Building at Wilmington. Captain John M. Greer, Officer in Charge of this district, states that North Carolina led all other districts in the United States for number of men accepted for enlistment during the month of June, and again leads all districts for the month of August. This is quite a record for this state as a new district when comparing it with other states of much greater populations.

Quite a larger number of these young men who apply for enlistment in the Marine Corps come from rural sections from 20 to 30 miles from the city. They enlist for nearly every reason under the sun: for adventure, Patriotic response, dissatisfaction with present employment, or the natural desire of practically every normal youth to travel about a bit and see what is going on elsewhere. The Marine Corps is able to fulfill any of these desires. Surplus Seeds Available For Flood Areas

The State College Extension Service has compiled a list of farmers having surplus legume and small grain seed available for the drought and flood stricken areas of North Carolina. A copy of this list has been placed in the hands of every county farm agent in the State.
John W. Godwin, assistant Extension director, acted promptly when it was evident that the dry weather in July and the heavy rains and floods in August had destroyed thousands of acres of food and feed crops, and many bushels of stored seed. He called upon Extension agents to report on seed surpluses in their counties.

The survey showed that there are available: 124,835 bushels of rye seed, 61,232 bushels of wheat, 18,500 bushels of barley, 1,000 bushels of hay, 30,000 bushels of crimson clover, 17,000 bushels of Italian rye grass, and 5,000 bushels of vetch.
"Farmers who have lost a part or all of their corn and hay crops should immediately communicate with their county farm agent and learn the sources of this surplus seed," Goodman said. This is the planting season for small grains and winter grazing crops in most of the State, and even in areas where the drought and floods did not cause any damage, it is wise to have some of these crops growing to protect and enrich the soil during the winter months.

The list of surplus seed sources shows the following varieties and amounts of oats available: Lee, 3,100 bushels; Fulgum 71,385; Forward 13,909; Farrow No. 1, 1,000; Fulcaster 300; V. P. L. No. 131, 1,000; Coker 32-1, 5,500; Coker 33-47, 1,000; Coker 33-50, 1,750; Norton 1,300; Fulgum, 13,000; and unnamed varieties, 12,500 bushels.

Dairymen Told How To Prevent Milk Fever

Milk fever annually causes the loss of many good milk cows, especially in the herds of small dairymen, says John A. Arey, Extension dairy specialist of N. C. State College. Such losses are usually unnecessary, he says, because milk fever can be prevented easily by correct feeding and management.

Using the methods employed in one large, high-producing Holstein herd as an example, Mr. Arey said that the following ration should be used for cows after they are dried off: Wheat bran 200 pounds ground oats 100 pounds; ground corn, corn meal or hominy 100 pounds; linseed meal 100 pounds; and steamed bone meal 15 pounds.
Mature cows should be fed from 10 to 12 pounds of this grain mixture per day to within two weeks of calving time, the dairy specialist advised. Then the following ration is used for the last two weeks, or to within one or two days of calving: Wheat bran, 100 pounds; ground oats 100 pounds; and linseed meal 45 pounds. The average amount of this ration fed should be about 10 pounds daily. Exceedingly large cows and heavy producers may be fed as much as 15 pounds.
