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Farm Questions

Q.—What price is the new milk plant at Stateville paying for fluid milk?

A.—Envision dairyman, John Arey, says this plant is paying \$1.69 per hundred pounds for 3 percent milk with a premium on milk of higher butterfat. Right now, 2,500 farms are supplying this milk plant with about 80,000 pounds of milk a day and are finding this market a good substitute for cash crops.

Q.—Is barley a good feed for hogs?

A.—Yes. Pound for pound it is not as efficient as corn but barley does produce pork of excellent quality. It does not pay to grind corn for hogs but it does pay to grind barley and the grinding increases its feed value by 17 percent. If barley is substituted for corn as hog feed, Extension swine specialist Ellis Vestal, recommends that 120 pounds of the whole barley replace 100 pounds of shelled corn. Because of the usual droughts in summer, it may be well to plant barley this fall for hog feed next year.

Continuation in 1941 of the Austrian winter pea and hairy vetch purchase program to encourage production of cover crop seed for use in Southern and East Central states has been announced.

Beaufort County farmers have received 50,000 pounds of Austrian winter peas, probably the largest single shipment of winter legume seed ever distributed in the county.

A one-variety cotton community has been organized in the J. P. Beasley community near Dunn with 20 members, reports J. B. Gouffray, assistant farm agent of Harnett county.

J. B. Wallin, a demonstration farmer of Madison County, made a net profit of more than \$1,000 during the past year from five dairy cows and a flock of 300 Barred Rock hens

Hybrid corn, being grown on 25,000,000 acres in the North Central states, constitutes more than half of the total corn acreage, reports the U. S. Agricultural Marketing Service.

Government figures indicate that nearly 12,000,000 farm family workers and hired hands will be busy with fall crops and livestock during September and October.

In commenting on these figures, Arey said: "An analysis of the average production of DHIA cows by states shows a close relation between feed production and milk production. The average butterfat production in 1939 for 10 Southern states, a deficient feed producing area, was 278 pounds, as compared to 10 Central Western states which grow ample quantities of feed.
