Students of Egyptology assert that the first newspaper, was a scarab made and circulated in Egypt in 1450 B. C. However, the first newspaper of which we are historically certain, was the Acta Publica, in the form of clay tablets, begun by Julius Caesar in 58 B. C.

The oldest printed newspaper, is the Peking News, which began publication 350 years before the invention of printing from movable type. It is now more than 1400 years old.

Canton, China, imports more than one million dollar's worth of old newspapers yearly, chiefly from the United States. They are used by the merchants of the city as a wrapping paper.

The smallest daily newspaper published is the Daily Bulletin of Tryon, N. C. It measures 5 1/2 by 8 1/2 inches, and is two columns wide and about seven inches deep.

Switzerland has three times as many newspapers as Great Britain, yet the British newspaper chains are the world's largest. One British chain exports control over 177 newspapers in England, Wales and Scotland.

Newspapers in Shanghai are often rented rather than sold. A paper is delivered first to a person who must get to work at an early hour. When he leaves home, the paper is collected by the newsboy who delivers it to another reader. This procedure is carried on so long that a week later the same copy may be in the hands of a rural reader one hundred miles outside the city. (Fact Digest).
