### "Land of Liberty's" Cast Of Thousands Includes 139 Famous Hollywood Players

AT DIXIE 26, 27 AND 28

"Land of Liberty," the spectacular picture showing next Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, at the Dixie Theatre, holds a record. Assembled by Cecil B. DeMille from 2,000,000 feet of film made available by 112 feature pictures and short subjects turned out during the past twenty-five years. It is estimated that the picture would cost millions of dollars if it were to be placed in production today in Hollywood's studios. Shown originally at the New York World's Fair and the San Francisco Exposition, the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America decided to sponsor it as a national product. All sales profits from this film will be donated to war emergency welfare work.

dispute. Actually, of course, airplane production is impeded by the strike. But official figures don't reflect that fact.

What some officials point to as a much better illustration is figures showing the number of labor disputes to which the U. S. Conciliation Service is having to assign mediator. Last September, the Conciliation Service assigned men to an average of 34 new labor disputes each week. In January, that average rose to 68 a week. And in February, the average was 82 NEW labor disputes each week.
