

SPEAKERS ANNOUNCED FOR FARM AND HOME WEEK

Featured speakers for the evening programs during Farm and Home Week, to be held at N. C. State College August 4-8, are announced by Dan M. Paul, secretary of the Farmers Convention.

Major General Jacob L. Devers, commanding officer of Fort Bragg, will report on the welfare of farm youths at training camps in an address on the Tuesday evening program, August 5. Dr. Helen Mitchell, director of nutrition for the Federal Security Agency, Washington, D. C., will discuss the relation of health to National Defense. Gov. J. M. Broughton will speak on the Tuesday night program.

John A. Arey, chairman of the Men's Programs, has completed arrangements for special forestry, poultry, agronomy, marketing, livestock and horticulture conferences.

The only speech at the forestry meeting on Tuesday morning will be by E. N. Nunns, chief of the Division of Forest Influences, U. S. Forest Service. Likewise, the poultry conference on Tuesday will include only one address by H. A. Biltmeyer, director of the Nutrition and Service for the Borden Co.

Appearing on the Animal Husbandry program will be: R. L. Lush of the National Fertilizer Association, Dr. R. E. McArdle of the U. S. Forest Service, Dr. R. B. Becker of the University of Florida, and Wayne Dinsmore of the Horse and Mule Association of America.

NISWONGER EXPLAINS HOW TO BEAT DROUGHT DAMAGE

Since the recent drought dried up some parts of Summer gardens, the months of July and August can be used to advantage in planting as

replacements many of the vegetables that were damaged by dry weather, says H. R. Niswonger, extension Horticulturist at N. C. State College.

Okra, tomatoes, lima and snap beans may be planted with good results in July, the horticulturist declared, adding that these vegetables will supply needed ingredients for canned soup mixtures in addition for home use. Seed for lettuce and celery plants also should be sown in July.

Seed of broccoli, Chinese cabbage and Swiss chard do best when sown in the garden row and later thinned out, Niswonger said.

Mustard, spinach and turnips should be planted in August, along with beets, carrots and rape, it was added. In that month a second set of tomato plants also might be set with usually good results. Lettuce, celery and collard plants also should be transplanted.

A good Fall garden depends largely on how well the soil is prepared for the job it will be called upon to do, Niswonger said. He declared that good seed, especially treated seed, are the best guarantee against plant diseases which take a big toll of garden production each year. Seed planted in the late summer should be planted a little deeper than that planted in the Spring, the specialist concluded.

FARMERS STILL HAVE EQUITY IN STORED COTTON

Farmers who stored cotton under government loan in 1938, 1939, and 1940, still hold an equity in cotton which has been kept in storage and they may stand to receive more than the original loan for the cotton. It is announced by G. Tom Scott of Johnston County, Chairman of the State AAA Committee.

Prevailing market prices now are several cents a pound higher than the loan rates for any of the past three years, and if the Commodity Credit Corporation, holder of the loan cotton, should find it necessary to market some of the stored lint to keep domestic prices from rising too high, farmers who stored the cotton on loan would share in the proceeds of the sale on the basis price and the original loan.
