DRIVERS' LICENSE REVOKED

Fifty Cleveland county motorists had their drivers' licenses revoked during the first six months of this year, the Highway Safety Division reported this week, compared with only 28 during the same period last year.

The 50 revocations in this county were a part of the record 3,866 made in the state. Total revocations since passage of the Uniform Driver's License Act in 1935 now number 35,524.

Drunken driving, of course, was the chief basis for the revocations. 3,115 of the 3,866 license revocations this year being based on drunken driving convictions in North Carolina courts, and 243 others on this charge in combination with other violations. Another 233 Tar Hell drivers lost their driving privilege because of convictions for "driving under the influence" in other states.

Gulford county led the state in revocations the first half of this year, with 227, followed by Mecklenburg with 183. Forsyth with 152, Cumberland with 131 Rowan with 117, Cabarrus with 110. Robeson with 107 and New Hanover with 99. Only one small county, Camden, reported no license revocations, the first six months of this year.

The 3,866 revocations so far this year represent an increase of 40 per cent above the 2,774 recorded in the same period last year.

FARM QUESTIONS

Q.—When should corn and sorghum be cut for silage?

A.—Dairy specialists of the State College Extension Service say that crops should be cut for silage when they contain the maximum feed nutrients and at the same time have sufficient moisture to pack well in the silo. With corn, the grain should be denting and the shuck slightly yellow. This stage of maturity is reached about a week or ten days before the corn is ready to cut and shock. Sorghum should be cut when the seed in the head are firm.

Q.—What types of vegetables can be put up with hot water canner?

A.—Only vegetables and fruits which are "acid" and can be safely preserved at a boiling temperature, 212 degrees F., may be canned with a hot water canner, says Mrs. Cornelia C. Morris, Extension food conservation specialist. This list includes tomatoes, fruits, freshly-gathered, young, tender string beans, and a pre-cooked soup mixture containing a large proportion of tomatoes. Such non-acid products as corn, peas, beans, spinach, okra and squash require a pressure canner.

Q.—When is the best time to seed a permanent lawn?

A.—Except for the Mountain section, the best results are usually secured by seeding grass in the early fall. John H. Harris, Extension landscape specialist of N. C. State College, says even in the mountains, at elevations of less than 2,500 feet, the best time to seed a lawn is in the early fall. By seeding in the fall, the grass will generally become well established before winter, and in the spring will have a good start on weeds and undesirable grasses.
