"NAVY INTELLIGENCE"



Is it necessary to be a high school graduate in order to enlist in the Navy?
 No. Navy cadets need not be high school graduates. All applicants will be given an examination containing approximately 100 questions. A grade of 50 per cent or better on this examination is sufficiently high to pass the Navy educational standards. However, a high school education will be valuable to the aviator during his Navy enlistment.

What does the term "ash can" mean in the Navy?
 An "ash can" is a slang term applied to the depth charge used to sink submarines. The average ash can is a cylindrical container with approximately 200 pounds of T.N.T. and can be dropped overboard from a ship and as depth charges from 20 to 300 feet. These are generally carried in the fast ships in the fleet, as a last ditch charge regulated to explode at 20 feet depth, move away from the explosion area at a speed of 25 knots or more. These "ash cans" are either rolled off the stern or shot from "y-guns" which burst one right and one left simultaneously.

Farmers Benefit In U. S. Purchases of Tomatoes

North Carolina farmers will receive with delight the benefit from government purchases of canned tomatoes. It was announced by David T. Home, Pitt County farmer and member of the State AAA committee.
 Under the U. S. Department of Agriculture's call last April for doubled tomato production in all parts of the country this year cur-

rent prices being received by farmers for tomatoes is equivalent to from \$8 to \$10 a ton over prices paid to farmers by canners last year. Mr. Home said.

The department's plan had been to boost prices by at least \$3 a ton.
 No tomato canner need worry about marketing his product. Mr. Home added, declaring that government is continuing its purchase program and is asking that farmers be allowed to participate in the bigger profits for the product.

In some instances, the AAA committee advised farmers have been told that canners could not pay better prices this year because the market was not sufficient to permit a price increase.

Now, however, canners are still being asked to submit offers to sell canned tomatoes to the government under the April buying program which was aimed to increase national production of the crop by 15,000,000 cases this year.

For a few weeks past the government had suspended its tomato buying program to await later news on the progress of the crop. The 1941 crop is estimated to be about 14 percent bigger than last year but unfavorable weather conditions in important producing areas have cut the estimated increase to six percent.
