WASHINGTON SNAPSHOTS

Sten felt pretty tired of worrying about impending inflation and the price-fixing mess, the apparent ineptitude of the Administration to formulate a labor policy, the fear that sources of taxation are being rapidly dried up with future billions still to be raised, and other gloomy and complex problems, so they departed the season open and immediately changed into their campaign against big business clothes.

Senator Murray of Montana, who is Chairman of a Senate Small Business Committee, is going with a formal statement charging that "big business dollar a year men, drawing huge salaries from private corporations, have moved into control of the Defense Commission, and made a sort of badge of honor for big business." He then asked for a million dollars for his committee.

Not to be outdone Senator Wallgren of Washington announced that he had requested the special Senate Defense Committee, headed by Senator Truman, to investigate the activities and collections of the more than 125 "dollar-a-year men" in Washington. A couple of other Senators joined in at once with similar proposals.

Just about this time the production engineers, management experts and other business men who had resigned their jobs in the corporation they had worked to build up to do their patriotic best in this time of "terrible urgency" began to get a little dizzy. But they went on, deciding the dizziness was just the result of plain "overwork."

There are plenty of Congressmen, however, who've stuck doggedly to work shamelessly neglecting the open season on big business. And reporters covering committee hearings have come away with the distinct impression that a new uneasiness is arising in the minds of some economic-minded Senators and Representatives about the financial structure of our government. They are asking a lot of questions, for example, about where new revenue can be raised without undermining the productive system of the country, what the effects are likely to be about the piling up of Government bonds in commercial banks, and other such ponderous topics.

Truth of the matter is that the voter back home is beginning to get worried, and his worry is being translated into letters to his Congressmen, and into ambitious local taxpayer programs to reduce local and state spending, and local and state taxes. Authoritative observers on Capitol Hill are giving considerable attention to the clamor coming from the distant communities for prudent government spending whether done by City Hall, the State Capitol, or the Congress.

With a national debt this year of exceeding \$51,000,000,000, and a deficit above \$2 billion dollars, with the necessity, after passing the biggest tax bill in history, of borrowing seven or eight billions more this fiscal year, earnest Congressmen are beginning to think some serious thought should be given, and some action taken in the direction of putting a halt to the mushrooming of non-defense activities of the government, and to saving some national pennies.

"ARMY FLASH!" Aircraft Warning Message!

Over telephone wires the warning of approaching enemy bombers is flashed from Observation Post to Filter Center to be played, evaluated, and transmitted to an Army office for action.

This system of telephone aircraft warnings, which will be used during the Army maneuvers in this area, is vital to our nation's defense. These practice aircraft warning messages will place an additional load on the user's busy telephone lines.
