Agriculture Provides most Hazardous Work

Strangely, agriculture is the most hazardous American industry, with the farm home contributing largely to this amazing total of accidents, says Miss Ruth Current, state home agent of the N. C. State College Extension Service.

In safety suggestions to North Carolina farm families, Miss Current urges that:

Sharpened tools be kept away from play places.
Stairways with more than three steps be equipped with handrails.

Free use of both hands not be sacrificed because of heavy load to carry.

Aut stairways be kept clear of toys, tools and boxes.

The State home agent also pointed out that the annual cost of farm and rural fires is \$200,000,000, two-thirds of the national fire loss. Then, too, besides this property damage, 3,500 lives are lost in these fires.

To combat this menace Miss Current urges that:

Every open fireplace be equipped with a screen.

Kettles, pans, and tubs of hot liquids be kept off the floor.
House dry cleaning be done out of doors.

Matches be kept away from children.

And napkins handles be kept away from the edges of stoves and tables.

Cuts, bruises, and infections should never be regarded as minor. Miss Current cautioned, as people have died as a result of a scratch becoming infected.

Sunlight and soybeans are suggested by the California College of Agriculture to poultrymen searching for substitutes to replace fish oils and meat in poultry rations.

Farm Questions

Q.—Does liming make better growth where lime and phosphate have been applied on the land?

A.—Not only is the liming beneficial but the crops following it are benefited. With better soils and more organic matter, the yields of corn and small grain can be increased. Liming furnishes about one-half of the lime hay produced in North Carolina.

Q.—When is the deadline for filing applications for conservation and parity payments under the 1941 AAA program?

A.—E. V. Floyd, AAA executive assistant, says these applications must be filed by March 31. Payments will not be made if applications are filed later than that date. The signing must take place at the AAA office in the county in which the farm is located. However, checks will be mailed directly to farmers this year instead of the grower having to come to the county AAA office when the check arrives.
