Admiral King Heads Navy Relief Society

NEW YORK.—Admiral Ernest J. King, Commander-in-Chief of the United States Fleet and Chief of Naval Operations, has been elected president of the Navy Relief Society, succeeding Admiral Harold R. Stark, who resigned after being assigned to duty in London as Commander of U. S. Naval Forces operating in European waters. It was announced recently.

At the same time Artemus L. Gates, Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Air, was elected honorary vice-president of the Society.

The Society was incorporated in 1904, although it was organized in 1820. President Franklin D. Roosevelt is honorary president and Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox is honorary vice-president, as are James V. Forrestal, Under Secretary of the Navy and Ralph A. Bard, Assistant Secretary of the Navy.

The Navy Relief Society cares for the emergency needs of the families and dependents of Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard men. At the present time a National Citizens Committee, headed by Clarence Dillon of New York, is raising \$5,000,000 in a nation-wide campaign to insure continuation of the work of the Society in the face of mounting casualties.

War Industry In Prison

RALEIGH.—Hugh Wilson, Director of Prison Industries in North Carolina, reported to Highway Chairman Ben Prince, that the necessity for prison shops all over the United States is close at hand. Wilson returned today from a meeting with War Production Board officials in Washington, D. C.

"I am confident North Carolina's prison shops will receive contracts for almost anything we are capable of supplying," Wilson said. "This would include identification tags, helmets, bomb fins or anything else which can be made with power presses or power brakes."

As a member of the Prison Industries advisory committee of the W.P.B., Wilson met with Maury Marvick, Chief of the Government Re-

quirements Division of the War Production Board. Purpose of the discussion was to devise ways and means by which prisons throughout the country could aid in war work. Results of the meeting was the setting up of a prison industries section for the W.P.B. This division would act as a clearing house for all required by industries, contracts distribution or military agencies and would contain an inventory of the types of work each prison shop in the country was capable of doing. Each prison would be allotted that work for which it was best equipped as the demand presented itself.

Though North Carolina prison officials stand ready to do any critical defense work necessary toward the final winning of the war, they are also mindful of the declining prison population which makes it needful for every available prisoner to be active with highway maintenance or routine industries activities.
