**War Causes Revival Of Home-Dried Foods**

Something old yet something new—that's the way Ruby Scholz, Extension economist in food conservation and marketing at N. C. State College, describes the home drying of fruits and vegetables.

An old fashioned practice used by earlier generations, drying has been replaced largely by more modern methods of preserving. However, war conditions are expected to revive this older art of saving food for part of season use.

To refresh the memories of those who have employed this method and to direct others who have had no experience with drying, the Extension Service has just issued a new circular, No. 232—Home Drying of Fruits and Vegetables.

A free copy of this publication may be secured from home demonstration agents or by writing to the Agricultural Editor, State College, Raleigh. A penny postal card is sufficient.

Miss Scholz, author of the circular points out that drying has a number of advantages. The product's weight is only one-fourth to one sixth that of fresh materials; there is a considerable reduction in bulk; storage is possible over long periods without the use of cans and jars; and little special equipment is needed.

Among the products that may be dried are: Apples, peaches, pears, corn, green beans, peas, lima beans and all kinds of leafy vegetables and figs do not dry successfully in this climate. Drying time will depend on climatic conditions and the method used.

**Many Growers Storing Wheat On Own Farm**

Many North Carolina wheat growers are storing the 1942 crop on their own farms this year to obtain federal loans according to W. Herbert White, Caswell County farmer and a member of the State AAA Committee.

Farm storage is available in North Carolina for the first time this year because of the record supply of wheat in the nation and in view of already overburdened transportation and storage facilities, White said.

Loan rates for the state have been set at \$1.27 per bushel for No. 2 wheat and \$1.25 per bushel for No. 3 wheat with corresponding lower prices for lower grades. Loan rates are lower for garlicky and smutty wheat of each grade. Loans are available to growers who planted within their wheat acreage allotments.

Stored wheat must be protected from the weather and must be on a platform at least 18 inches above the ground. Farm storage bins are subject to approval of the county AAA committee.

The seven-cent storage fee paid by the producer will make it possible for many farmers to contract

or repair storage bins large enough for their wheat," he said. "In many cases farmers will store wheat on the farms of their neighbors, and at least five groups are planning to rent warehouses on a cooperative basis."

He cautioned growers to take good care of their wheat both before and after it is stored and to report any damage immediately to the county AAA committee.

Elevator storage now is available at Greensboro and Stateville. Farmers storing wheat in commercial elevators or warehouses are eligible to apply for loans as soon as the wheat is delivered.

Farmers in Forsyth County have been engaged with work in taking advantage of recent rains, says R. W. Fox, Extension Service farm agent.
