Henry Morgenthau Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, today made public the official War Bond Quotas by States for the month of July, which provides a total of a billion-dollar-a-month basis to aid in meeting the War cost. The above table also gives May War Bond sales in the various States in comparison to the May Quota. (June sales by States will be available for publication shortly.) The percentage of Quotas raised from 71.5 percent above quota in Utah to 22.5 percent below the quota in Montana, but puts the nation as a whole above the \$500,000,000 total May quota. Valuable Alaska and Hawaii led all States in sale of War Bonds on quota basis.

"We're Buying at Least 10¢" reads the sticker, printed in the national color. The new window stickers on the new "10¢" label button, which indicates the 10¢ in saving at least ten percent of his income in War Bonds every pay day, are parades of patriotism in the War Bond drive.

Shortage Of Grade A Milk Faced In State

A shortage of Grade A milk for use by Army camps and civilians in North Carolina is predicted for the near future by John A. Arvey, Extension dairyman of N. C. State College. He makes a patriotic plea to all dairymen to feed liberally and obtain the maximum production from every cow.

During the past winter and spring approximately 1.500 gallons of milk were delivered daily to Army camps within the State Army. This demand will be increased by 4,000 to 5,000 gallons of milk daily when new military centers for the fighting forces of the Nation are opened during the next few months.

Local dairies have so far been able to supply their camp and civilian demand for fluid milk reported the Extension worker, but it will be difficult for them to meet an increased demand. To do so will require maximum production from all available herds located within the area from which milk can be collected.

Good production requires liberal feeding, he continued, and that means every dairymen must produce this summer all the hay and silage his herd will need next winter. Ample roughage production is doubly important in view of indications that grain and prices will be higher in the fall and winter.

Hay making is one of the next harvesting jobs on the farm, and Arvey emphasized the importance of cutting hay at the proper time to get the most tonnage and the maximum feeding value. Alfalfa should be cut when one tenth to one fourth in bloom; lespedeza, when the crop is about one half in bloom, and soybeans, from bloom to when the seed are beginning to form.
