**Waste Fats Needed To Make Explosives**

Fats make glycerine and glycerine makes explosives to down Axis planes, stop Axis tanks and sink Axis ships. Dean I. O. Schaub, director of the State College Extension Service, says housewives can help supply the vital war material. Dean Schaub has accepted the post as Chairman of the Consumer Division of the State Salvage Committee. Mrs. Estelle T. Smith, assistant to the State home demonstration agent, is chairman of the Women's Division of the Salvage Committee.

These two State College leaders have united in an appeal to all North Carolina housewives to save waste fats. Don't throw away a single drop of used cooking fats, they said. This includes bacon grease, dripping, frying fats—every kind you use. After you have got all the cooking good from them put them through a kitchen strainer into a clean wide-mouthed can. Store in a cool dark place.

Dean Schaub explained that most dealers are patriotically serving as collectors of the waste fats. They have asked that waste fats be brought to them in one pound lots, preferably early in the week. They will weigh the fats, pay the housewife for them, and start them on the way to the war industries.

Mrs. Smith lists four things NOT TO DO: (1) Don't take less than one pound at a time to your meat dealer; (2) Don't take your fats in glass containers or paper bags; (3) Don't allow fats to stand so long that they become rancid because if they do the glycerine content is reduced; and (4) Don't take your fats to the meat dealer on week ends when he is usually the busiest.

**State College Has Plan Simple Peanut Picker**

Scores of North Carolina farmers have patriotically grown one or two acres of peanuts this year to help supply the vital vegetable oils needed to win the war. Dr. E. R. Collins, agronomy Extension leader of N. C. State College, says some of these farmers now find themselves without means of harvesting the peanuts for oil. They are being tempted to turn their hogs into the peanut fields.

David S. Weaver, State College agricultural engineer, announces that the Extension Service has prepared a plan for a small home-made

peanut picker. A blueprint and the questions for building this simple harvesting device will be sent free to farmers upon request to 7-25 county farm agent.  
 The home-made peanut picker is a large bottomless tin with a wide mesh wire over the top and hardware cloth as a bottom. Weaver explained the peanuts are passed over the top wire by hand, with the peanuts being pulled off by the wire. The small mesh hardware cloth in the bottom permits the dirt and sand to pass through, but retains the nuts. The equipment is provided with legs, or may be put on two car wheels.  
 Because of the labor involved in picking peanuts by this method, the agricultural engineer says this picker will not be satisfactory for the farmer who grows more than one or two acres.  
 Don't hog down your peanuts this year, urges Dr. Collins. The United Nations need all the vegetable oils they can obtain due to the loss of imports from the Far East. It is the patriotic duty of every North Carolina farmer to follow through with his peanut production for oil.
