WITH THE BOYS IN SERVICE Dear Mr. Lynch There are a dozen of us Kings Mountain boys sitting here now in a barracks in Fort McClellan, Ala. We have just had a happy reunion as part of us have been in another Company about 1-4 of a mile away and just found out today that another group of Kings Mountain boys were here in the same camp. There is a Kings Mountain Herald here which is worn and tattered as it is the only one in camp and all the fellows have looked at it. There must be at least 25 K. M. boys here and maybe more. Seven of us are in one Company 17th Bu and the rest are here in the 7th Bu My Bu the 17th is situated on a small mountain and the 7th is in the valley 1-4 of a mile below. The land in the valley is sorta sandy but up on the mountain-side where I live the mud is red and since it is a newer section of the camp we do not have good streets.

All the boys here are interested in home and are very anxious to get mail. It is very discouraging to stand in line for mail call and not get any mail when the other fellows do. So please urge the home folks to write often.

My first impression of this camp was terrible. It was raining every day Wednesday. That night I was in the mess hall and saw some of the boys who were in the same camp as I was. They were all from Kings Mountain and we had a good talk.
