Very little new farm machinery will be manufactured for the duration, and D. S. Weaver, Extension agricultural engineer of N. C. State College says it is absolutely essential that farmers protect and preserve the machinery they now have. Some machines will be irreplaceable, he declared, and failure to protect and preserve them may result in not only an individual, but a National loss.

Rust is one of the chief enemies of farm machinery, said Weaver. Most paints form a protective covering over the metal, but only red lead paint will actually prevent rust.

The farm engineer says that red y-prepared red lead paints are available, and the only caution is to secure a high class product. Cheap paint is a mistake at any time, says Weaver, particularly in this time. Standard brands turned out by reliable manufacturers should be used.

Some farmers prefer to make up their own paint. The Extension specialist suggests the following directions in preparation of homemade paint:

1. By volume, mix three parts of dry red lead and one part of raw linseed oil. Allow this mixture to stand at least three days so that the oil will thoroughly wet the dry red lead.

2. Thin the past to painting consistency with an equal volume of thinning mixture composed of six parts of raw linseed oil, two parts of turpentine, and one part of kerosene.

3. Stir thoroughly and strain out lumps of foreign material. You can not stir too much, and frequently paint is stirred too little.

4. Use a good brush and apply thoroughly to all exposed surfaces of the metal.

Veterinarian Issues Timely Animal Hints

You don't do farmers, to help them avoid fall livestock losses, have been issued by Dr. C. G. Grinnell, veterinarian of the United Experiment Station of N. C. State College.

His suggestions, based on a study of principal causes of fall losses among farm animals, include:

Don't allow fall pigs to be farrowed in old hog lots infested with worms and disease germs.

Keep stock in cold drafty buildings. Such an environment is favorable to the development of flu and pneumonia.

Don't bring new feeder animals on to the farm without a proper certificate of veterinary inspection; always isolate new stock from other animals for three weeks to prevent spread of possible disease.

Don't overcrowd poultry houses. It endangers flock health.

Don't take chances with hog cholera. Have a veterinarian check the herd and vaccinate fall pigs as soon as they are weaned.

Don't turn horses and cattle into cornstalk fields without housing; watch on them; cornstalk disease is always a danger; greater care should be observed in this wartime year.

Don't let insanitary livestock quarters endanger profits; all stock barns should be cleaned and disinfected before cold weather.

Don't risk raising the dairy herd through mastitis. If any cows show inflamed udders or abnormal milk, have them examined.

Don't forget that lives depend on plenty of vitamins during the dark fall and winter weather. Vitamin A and D are essential.

In livestock feed, Vitamin A is found only in yellow corn, green leafy legume hay, and succulent pasture.

Don't feed soft or damaged corn to livestock.

Congratulations to the 100,000 members of the 4-H Clubs in North Carolina who are extending by L. R. Starr, State 4-H Club leader of the N. C. State College Extension Service, in connection with the State and National 4-H Achievement Weeks. The State celebration is being held this week, November 1-7, and the National observance of 4-H Achievement Week is scheduled for November 7-14.

Harrill and Miss Frances MacCregor, assistant state club leader, made a sample survey of 4-H activities in 26 counties and they found evidence that approximately \$267,419 worth of War Savings Bonds and Stamps have been purchased.

\$194,217 worth sold by the 4-H clubs of the State.

The 100,000 club members collected approximately 6 1/2 million pounds of scrap metal, more than one million pounds of scrap paper and rags, and \$2,677 worth of scrap rubber through their cooperation in the Salvage for Victory program.

About 16,504 members increased the farm family's fuel supply through 4-H Forestry projects, 5,000 members participated in fire prevention work, and 15,723 enlisted in the campaign to repair and care for farm machinery.

A total of 14,190 members took first aid courses, 1,788 farm boys and girls are acting as aid raid war dogs, and 29,005 are cooperative with local defense agencies in other activities.

Of 16 average industrial workers 7 drive their autos, 2 use public transportation, and one walks.

Travel by passenger autos in 1940 was about 7 times the mileage of all other means of transportation combined.
