## Turkey For Soldiers On Thanksgiving

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 10.—It's going to be turkey with trimmings on Thanksgiving Day, November 26, for the soldiers at Army posts and camps in the southeastern states and there'll be no skimpy helpings. Prepared menus, released today at headquarters Fourth Service Command, show that there'll be 100 pounds of turkey supplied for every 100 men — and a pound of turkey is not a lunch room sandwich slice in any kind of language.

Neither will the boys be exactly starved at breakfast on this holiday. Just to whet their appetites, for the morning meal will consist of oranges — one orange per man — oatmeal, fresh milk, scrambled eggs, bacon curls, toast, butter and — yes sir — coffee, plenty of it.

And the mess sergeants are going to feed them in the evening just like they hadn't had a belt-tight'ing meal at noon — and it won't be turkey hash. For supper they'll have: cold cuts, sliced cheese, po-

toe salad, sandwich bean, butter, chocolate marshmallow candies and tea.

But the big feed at noon is where they'll give the fighting men the culinary works. Here's that Thanksgiving Dinner menu:

## Trucks, Buses, Out Of State Cars Worst Offenders

Highway Nov. 10 Out of state cars, buses and tractor-truck-unit trailers are the worst offenders in breaking the 35 mph victory speed limit, according to data secured by James S. Lutz, Engineer of the State Police and Fighting for the U. S. State Highway Commission.

Using special stop watch devices on several primary North Carolina highways, Lutz clocked 1121 vehicles. Findings: its witness checks showed only 41 percent of all drivers are complying strictly with the 35 miles per hour limit. Another 30 percent are driving from 36 to 40 miles per hour and the other 29 percent drive better than 40 miles per hour, 41 percent of whom do better than 45.

From a 1940 speed check, Lutz says the average pace time speed was 44 miles per hour. This has now been reduced to 37.

Lutz's figures show that 56 percent of out of state cars are traveling better than 40 miles while only 23 percent of local cars are so doing. Half of the buses on the highways and 41 percent of the big tractor-trailer truck outfits are also running faster than 40.

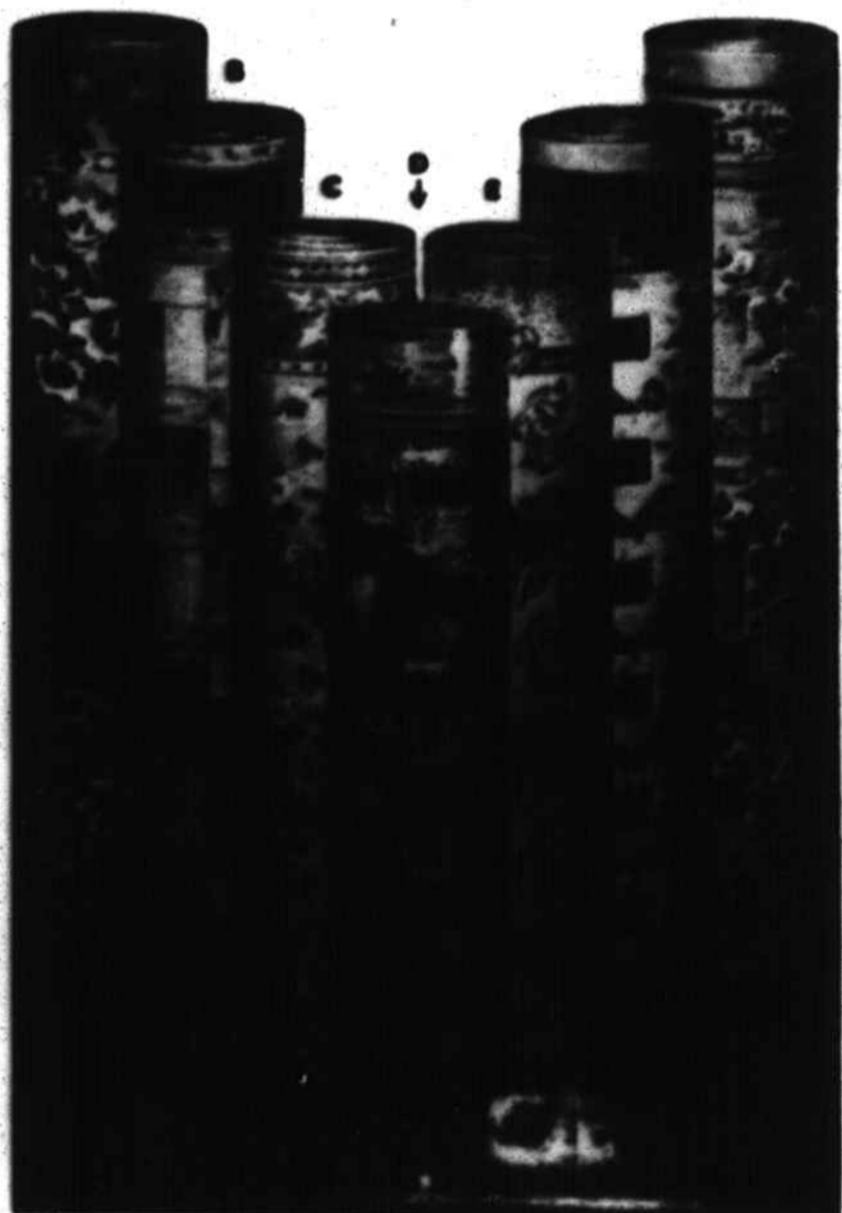
