Booklet Tells Of Soldiers' Dependents And Welfare

Atlanta Ga. - A booklet giving information concerning provisions made under the law covering Army regulations and instructions for the welfare protection and security of soldiers' dependents, is announced by the War Department to the southeastern states today through headquarters Fourth Service Command.

The booklet, entitled "Personal Affairs of Military Personnel and Their Dependents" will be distributed in the Army so that every soldier will have access to it. It contains those already in the service and others as they enter. Dependents and others desiring copies of the booklet may obtain them by writing to the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D. C., and enclosing 10 cents to cover the cost of printing.

Information contained in the booklet includes allotment of pay and deductions, pay allowances and all forms of personal reported military income in action or captivity, bank accounts, medical attendance and hospital facilities for dependents and covers countless other points about the welfare of the soldier and those he left behind.

Coffee To Be Rationed Beginning Nov. 29th

Starting November 29, the United States, the world's greatest coffee producing country, will ration its coffee so that no one will receive more than a pound of the beverage once every five weeks.

The reason for our going on a ration basis can be put in a word - sugar.

The bottom that ply between here and Brazil, Colombia and other South American countries are now freighting bauxite ores from the Guianas to the aluminum for our planes. Nitrate for gun powder and explosives, pork the hulls of boats putting out of Chile, Guatemala and other Central American coffee boats are so jammed with sugar, coffee and other goods to the shores of England, Russia, Africa and wherever our troops and some of our Allies are fighting in addition much of what coffee is being transported is going to our armed forces.

As a result of the shipping situation for every four pounds of coffee the country was importing a year ago before Pearl Harbor we are now only getting three pounds in 1943 imports of green (unroasted) coffee from South and Central American coffee imports amounted to 2.2 billion pounds in 1942 that figure will be cut to 1.7 billion pounds during the five year period, 1947 through 1951. U. S. coffee drinkers - about 80 percent of the adult population - consumed 23 pounds annually. The current ration would allow 10.4 pounds annually - about half the former consumption rate.
