**THE HOME FRONT**

Not the least of the reasons for this is the oppression of the people. The Nazis have shot and imprisoned thousands of people and have destroyed educational institutions.

as percent of all elementary schools have been closed. Thousands of Greek teachers have been sent to forced labor camps. Polish higher education has been destroyed, the great University of Warsaw closed. Poles are not admitted to institutions of learning reserved for the children of transplanted Germans. A similar situation is being created in the occupied countries. Yet the spirit of the people in most of these countries remains unbroken, and their underground resistance, which has seriously hampered the Nazis' war plans, will be an increasing menace to the invaders as Allied advances promise future victory.

On the Home Front our morale is put to the test by discomforts and restrictions we must undergo for the sake of our single war aim — the destruction of those forces that threaten the very foundations of civilization: our homes and schools. Nationalistic passions have not saved our precious rubber supply in the face of these minor inconveniences. Standing in crowded vehicles may be another. By cutting down a way — we will not do away with overcrowding but we lessen a far greater danger to our nation's security, of which the transportation system is the backbone. The war has a breakdown in the transportation system. Our country's freight and passenger transportation has been disrupted.

**FUEL OIL SITUATION GETS WORSE:** With fuel oil going overseas in larger quantities, the Eastern fuel oil situation continues to worsen. New restrictions have been placed on consumption of fuel oil and kerosene by space heaters other than furnaces. Those who use oil or kerosene stoves must apply for fuel rations on a basis of not more than 550 square feet of floor area per heater unless it can be proved that the equipment must actually heat a larger total area. And all those persons, except private home owners, who apply for fuel oil rations for heating apartments, office buildings, institutions and the like, must prove that the furnaces cannot be converted to coal burning before they receive their ration.

More and more the country's wholesalers and retailers are becoming a vital part of the program of price control and commodity distribution under Government regulations. The fundamentals of coffee rationing will be simply and graphically explained in words and pictures in hundreds of thousands of food stores throughout the country. Store keepers will be expected to see that their customers adhere to the rationing program, and count all coffee on hand November 28, as part of their ration. Restaurants, hotels, and institutions will be entitled to as much coffee, less stocks on hand, from Nov. 22 thru Jan. 31, as they used in September and October. Coffee inventories of retailers and wholesalers at the start of rationing may be obtained from supplies through "purchase warrants" issued by the purchasers, instead of using purchase certificates issued by local boards as was done under sugar rationing.

**RETAILERS TO PUSH WAR DRIVES:** The Nation's retail industry has pledged its promotion facilities to cooperation in a basic government program of war campaigns, starting in January. This program will be linked with retail promotion and advertising, and will stress the importance of salvage, tire conservation, war rationing, saving household equipment and cooking gas, other home aids, and war bonds and stamps.

Field engineers of the War Production Board are working closely with owners and managers of small plants selected for subcontracts on war orders, but owners and managers seeking war contracts should not come to Washington un-

Metal kitchen utensils, cooking utensils and house wares of all kinds are going off the shelves except eight items — wire strainers, can openers, egg beaters, food mills, can crushers, can openers, and commercial type cake mixers and heating spoons. The National Dairy Industry drive has turned in over six million pounds of scrap material. Parts of 10 acres or more may include used gasoline dispensing pumps, and equipment used in steel mills. # Voluntary Rationing Of Medical Care

As more and more Kings Mountain doctors join the Armed Forces, the problem of serving the civilian population with adequate medical care becomes increasingly critical. The purpose of this message is to point out several ways to conserve the time and energy of the greatly overburdened doctors whose responsibility it is to give medical care to those on the home front.

### Your Cooperation Will Assure Better Medical Care For All

How can you and your family get the most from the limited medical services that will be available? Here are some suggestions for voluntary "rationing" that will assure better medical service for all:

**Go To Your Doctor's Office if You Can...**  
Avoid calling your doctor to call at your home. Go to his office if possible. This will not only save his time, but save you money as well.

**Help Your Doctor Protect His Health...**  
Your overworked doctor must have his sleep and regular meals to protect his health. SLEEP is important. Avoid night calls except in extreme emergencies.

**Phone For Home Calls Before 8:00 A. M.**  
Which home calls are necessary, phone your doctor before 8 o'clock in the morning if possible. Then he can plan his home calls efficiently and avoid "bothering."

**Be Patient! Doctors Are Very Busy...**  
Remember, your doctor has almost twice as many patients as before. Please be patient if home calls are delayed or longer waits are necessary at his office.

**Don't Neglect Early Signs of Sickness...**  
Watch for early signs of sickness. Don't try to "wait out" obvious symptoms. When children cough in the morning with 100 degree temperature or more, phone your doctor at once.

**Use The Phone In Minor Cases...**  
Often a few minutes on the phone with your doctor or his nurse will straighten out minor cases. Use the phone and let your doctor decide if a call is necessary.
