Dear Walter:

Well, here I am at my thousand dollar desk, sitting in my guinea chair, all ready for army life. And what a life this is. Breakfast in bed every morning, you get up want, telephone by your bed, maid, bell boys, sergeants. Anything you ask you get IT, and boy! YOU should know what IT is, for IT is ME—(Sherman was right).

Well, anyway I think I will open a new front. Everyone else is boy, you should see me now. Just got through eating my turkey dinner. We had everything and all the trimmings, except that bottled stuff.

The clothes they have are tops. I got one blue serge suit (blue denim), one tuxedo (also blue denim)

two pair shoes (twenty lbs. each), overcoat built for two (for one man), toilet articles, mess kit (what you eat from on the table), two wool uniforms, khakis and one flight jacket. I carried this most of the way here. This, I think is the only Republican town in the South, but they are good people, though. If you go to church they invite you to dinner and boy or boy, do I go to church. Well, "Walter," has the draft board caught you yet? You better start being good boy I am telling you. If you are used to going places around. And I do mean around. Well, you just couldn't get "Red" to having things your own way. For I know that a CO is a lot more interesting means new. When you salute a officer, you say "I am your dog," as saying "I am your dog." When he returns the salute, that is the same as saying, "You L—right you are." Well "Walter" I had better close as the Col. and Major want me to go frolicking with them tomorrow.

Tell EVERYBODY not to write me because soldiers don't like to get mail. Although my address is going to be on the end of this, just in case anybody wants to be different.

I think we will be there for the next one. I sure do have a swell buddy. His name is Tex Abernathy. He lives in Texas. Tell all the boys around K. M. hello. Say hello to Frank Roper, my wife, Mrs. Edna Phillips. Well, I will sign off here. Hoping to hear from you soon.
