RANDOM NOTES

I have been interested in reading letters from our boys in service scattered here and there. Read excerpts from two letters in Monday's issue that are of particular interest because the writers are from families well known here.

One letter was from Rufus Plonk, Jr. of Bessemer City, Staff Sergeant with the American forces now in Africa. The letter was written since Christmas and he says in part: "Have received so much mail in past few days, hardly have room in my pup tent with all the mail and boxes I am getting. I am going to have to enlarge my tent or move out."

"You must have thought I was awfully dirty from the amount of soap you sent. It can be used though. Put some of it to use today. Went to the creek and washed my clothes as well as myself. Wind was pretty cool but the water was fine. I traded some soap to an Arab for some oranges. Weather gets pretty warm around 10 a. m. and remains so until the sun goes down then I have to put on everything I have to keep warm."

Rufus tells of his many vaccinations and continues his letter by saying: "We were paid this time in French money. Up until yesterday it took 75 francs to make one dollar, but the rate of exchange is now fifty francs, so over night I picked up around \$20.00."

"We are staying busy - Makes one feel good to complete a problem with good results. I also have a good congenial bunch to work with. This time two years ago, I was getting ready to come into the Army. Certainly didn't expect all this then. Seems now as though I've always been in and I'm afraid I won't know how to act if I ever do get out again."

The other letter from Lieut. John Hovis of Bessemer City, with the U. S. Air Corps, Algeria, North Africa. Family well known here. Lieut. Hovis wrote that for the first six weeks after his arrival there, his plane was his home. He flew it by day and slept in it by night. Had to sleep in it to protect it from Arabs who if they had a chance would strip it bare of all useful articles, especially cloth, etc. Lieut. Hovis tells the following amusing incident showing he is also a "trader." "There are many Arabs around here. They love to trade and some good peddling things to sell or trade on. One day I traded with one - gave him a two piece suit of

my winter underwear in exchange for two dolls. Next day I was can't say how much I liked we were on who came walking down the street but that Arab dude with his nose on his hat that two piece suit of underwear."

Lt. Hovis is using a transport ship. Prof. John Helling, Jr. is now in La. Annapolis and is very much pleased with his position.

It's not good news but have heard that Billy White, who has been in some of the Pacific Islands for sometime in our army's service, is returning to Camp Jackson, Pa. some time ago. He was hungry for the sight of a familiar face and would like to know where to find a Kings Mountain boy. Went to the Post Chapel to worship and met up with Lt. Charles Troy Casperson from his home town (Lenoir) and church.

Patsy Grace Patterson bumped into Jackie Kaskis, Quary's son, and husband, Ensign Quary in New York Central Station, New York City (recently). Says she thinks Jackie's husband is just fine and says she was known how fine Jackie was. After Ensign Quary's departure Jackie returned to Washington.

The world seems to be a very small place and getting smaller. Pat Patterson (Shirley) writes that she was sending out messages from the office at the Air Base, Santa Ana, Calif. and noticed that one of the Cadets serving as messenger looked familiar. Finally she asked him where he was from and he said "KINGS MOUNTAIN, N. C."

Pat was overjoyed when she found that she was talking to Cadet James Ware, son of Grady Ware and the late Mrs. Ware. She invited Cadet Ware and a friend of his from Pennsylvania to spend the week end as her guests at Laguna Beach. She turned her apartment over to them while she stayed with friends in the next door apartment. On Sunday she took them to church. She enjoyed them thoroughly. Says Cadet Ware is a fine intelligent interesting boy - a credit to any town. Pat says they are having busy times at the office and added to
