He suggests that growers keep a careful check on infestation and, as soon as they find one weevil per 500 plants, jump into the fight Weevils usually appear around the edge of fields and along overgrows ditchtonks and it is here that par tacular attention should be given the crop. It is best to make counts at about tour different points to field to check it thoroughly.

Coon points out that either the dust or the liquid tratment can be used for pre-square poisoning. In dusing, equal parts of calcium aree nate and hydrated lime, should be thoroughly mixed and applied at the rate of three to four pounds of the mixture per acre, when the air

For mopping, the 1-1-1 mixture, constating of one pound of calcium arespair to one gallon of water and one gation of molasses, is used. The mixture should be stirred trequently while it is being applied and it should be used the same day it is
