

Cooperation Asked In Delivering Parcels To Soldiers

ATLANTA, Ga. — Acting Secretary of War McChesney has called for the individual cooperation of all citizens in order that the War Department may carry out its pledge to deliver to all soldiers overseas the Christmas presents sent by their families and friends. It was revealed by Lt. Colonel Hartley B. Dean, Chief of Postal Section, Headquarters Fourth Service Command.

Although early estimates place this year's total number of parcels destined for stations outside the

continental limits of the United States at 25,000,000, the figure may be a much higher. Normal restrictions requiring a request from an overseas soldier before a particular package may be mailed to him are being lifted for the 30 day period beginning Sept. 15. Only one package will be accepted for mailing by or in behalf of the same person or concern to or for the same address during any one week and the package must not weigh over five pounds. This is important, Col. Dean emphasized, and checking by postal officials will be in effect.

Cautioning the mailing public to exercise extreme care in the wrapping and addressing of this year's overseas Christmas gift packages, Col. Dean recalled that last year more than 10 percent of the 5,000,000 packages mailed overseas were insignificantly or incorrectly addressed necessitating individual directory service with resultant cumulative delays in transit.

Average mailing addresses should include the soldier's full

name, rank, Army serial number, service organization and unit, APO number and the respective post of embarkation postmaster.

Packages should be securely packed and wrapped in such a manner as to readily permit inspection prior to their dispatch, as every package moving overseas must be individually opened, inspected and re-wrapped at the post of embarkation.

The Army Postal Service and the United States Post Office Department, which is working in conjunction with the War Department, is strongly urging that insofar as possible packages be mailed on September 15 or immediately thereafter. Present schedules indicate that with a fairly even flow of incoming mail during the 30 day period allotted, all mail can and will be delivered shortly after mid-December. However, Col. Dean emphasized, should the mailing public delay posting parcels until just before the October 25 deadline, it will be almost impossible to assure delivery of these parcels at the desired time.

The Army Postal Service, the Transportation Corps, the Post Office Department, and all other governmental agencies are prepared for the problems, and it is anticipated that the record volume will be handled without undue delay if — but only if — the public does its part.
