RANDOM NOTES

Excerpts from letters written by Curtis Gaffney, Pfc. U. S. M. C. from the Southwest Pacific will give a close-up of what some of our own boys have been through in recent months. The letters written some-time ago refer to experiences in Guadalcanal, the New Georgia Island engagement and other. He writes in part:

"Dear Mom and Dad: Really I don't know what to write. There is much I could tell you of this place if the censor would only allow me. I've lain in fox-holes for many hours — my stomach was so sore — my nerves were shattered — I couldn't eat or sleep, when I had a chance. At night with the enemy planes overhead, my teeth really chattered. But I'm doing my bit and

my part. I know that has to be done and with the help of God I know I CAN CAN DO IT. W. N. "If my folks are few and far between, I know you'll understand that he's a boy trying to fight like a man.

"Please write as often as you can as news from home keeps morale high and helps chase away the blues. It has been three weeks since I've heard from any of you. Remember me in your prayers and give my love to all."

In another letter Curtis writes:

"Dad I've received the candy you sent and it was really good. I shared with the others and they asked me to thank you.

"I suppose you have read of the new campaign we're engaged in and have heard of it over the radio. For the past few days we've had it very hard but now I think we've got them on the run. I don't know why I've been spared unless in answer to your prayers. Keep on praying and if it's God's will I hope to be with you again.

"Mom a month ago I thought there wasn't much to war but now I know what they mean when they speak of hell on earth. Tell the folks that out of our squad, only three are left — Cade, Wjwhim and I — so keep praying for us." Curtis' address is Pfc. Curtis V. Gaffney, USMC, G.
