

**Shield For Army**

ATLANTA, Ga.—An eyeshield, designed by the Chemical Warfare Service as an eye protection in case of gas attack, is doing its bit in the Army despite the fact that thus far the war has been quiet.

Reports reaching the Chemical Warfare Branch, Fourth Service Command, state that these shields are now being issued to soldiers in the theaters of operations to the number of six per man. It is made of flexible transparent plastic and is proving effective in protecting the eyes of soldiers, particularly those who drive motorized apparatus — from dust and wind.

It is equipped with two adjustable elastic straps hooked together at the back of the head. Ball and socket snap fasteners allow the shield to be flexed into proper position. It is comfortable worn in the alert position on the forehead or is

**Trim Up Top Salary List, But Oh, That Tax!**

Mayer To Net Only \$122,500 From His \$249,705 Stipend.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Hollywood star Ginger Rogers and three motion picture magnates placed along the 10 highest paid Americans in 1941. The Treasury's annual blue ribbon salary list showed today.

By winning ninth place with \$255,000, Miss Rogers took a 25-percent value price tag well ahead of Bing Crosby, Jimmy Cagney, and Clark Gable, who made the top ten the year before, but not in 1941.

For the fifth consecutive year, Louis E. Mayer, production chief of Loew's Inc., led the nation with the top stipend, receiving \$249,705, which was \$245,340 more than for 1940.

On the basis of present income taxes and average deductions, about \$122,500 net would remain after payment of Federal taxes on such an income.

The top ten American money-makers (exclusive of those receiving income largely from investments) were:

- 1—Louis E. Mayer, vice president of Loew's Inc. and head of production for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer: \$249,705.
- 2—C. G. Swobilla, president of the Dixwell Corporation, a management company connected with the High Standard Co., commercial fire insurance firm, of which Swobilla is a vice-president.
- 3—E. G. Grace, president of Bethlehem Steel Co.: \$237,734.
- 4—Thomas J. Watson, president of International Business Machines Corp.: \$220,250.
- 5—J. B. Hawley, Jr., president of Northern Pump Co., of Minnesota: \$212,900.
- 6—Nicholas M. Svhenck, president of Loew's Inc.: \$125,300.
- 7—J. E. Owsley, vice president of the Dixwell Corp.: \$121,250.
- 8—C. S. Woolman, vice president of Hales and Hunter Co., III, manufacturer of dog and poultry feed: \$120,480.
- 9—Ginger Rogers — \$255,000 — \$225,000 from Twentieth Century-Fox Films, Inc., and \$30,000 from R. K. O-Radio Pictures, Inc. (both for calendar year 1941.)
- 10—E. J. Mannix, vice president of Loew's Inc., and general manager of M. G. M. Studios: \$224,120.

North Carolina: Dumont Dunbar, \$173,540.21 from the Burlington Mills Corporation in compensation the Treasury listed as other than salary, commission, or bonus; J. C. Cowan, Jr., \$78,022.02 from the same corporation, of which \$24,000 was listed as salary and \$54,022.02 as "other compensation;" William Shipman, \$70,540.00 from the same corporation in "other compensation;" J. Spencer Love, \$150,425.97 from the same corporation, of which \$40,000 was given as salary and \$110,425.97 as other compensation; A. E. Finley, \$102,353.61 from the North Carolina Equipment Company, of which \$5,000 was listed as salary and \$97,353.61 as bonus; and S. Clay Williams, \$100,000 from the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Co., all of which was designated as salary.

South Carolina: S. H. Swint, \$84,026.01 from the Graniteville Company, of which \$24,000 was listed as salary and \$60,026.01 as bonus; and H. A. Woodhead, \$84,026.01 from the same corporation, of which \$24,000 also was listed as salary and \$60,026.01 as bonus.
