RATION REMINDERS

MEATS, FATS: Brown stamps Y and Z in Book Three are good thru March 30. Red 10 point stamps A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z in Book Four are good thru May 30

PROCESSED FOODS: Green stamp E, L, and M are good thru March 30. Blue 10-point stamps A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z in Book Four are good thru May 30.

SUGAR: Stamp 30 in Book Four is good indefinitely for five pounds. Stamp 40 in Book Four is good for five pounds of canned sugar thru February 28, 1945.

GASOLINE: In 17 East Coast States, A5 coupons are good through May 5.

TIRE INFLATION DEADLINES: For A-coupon holders, March 31; for B-coupon holders, May 31; and for C-coupon holders June 30.

FUEL OIL: Period 4 and 5 coupons are good in all areas through September 30.

SHOES: Stamp No. 18 in Book One is good thru April 30. Adolph stamp No. 1 in Book Three is good indefinitely. Another ration stamp good for one pair of shoes beginning May 1 will be announced soon.

WARRIOR'S SPIRIT

Many of the regulations and controls have been set by the Army and Navy and not by Congress or the administration, pointed out the congressman. They are winning this war and he bids the people be calm and patient until these controls are lifted or modified.

"When this war is over we will have our bellyfull of centralized government and I trust will get back to some states' rights and individual freedom and enterprise," he added with characteristic Morrison emphasis.

He contended that government is costing too much. Most of this cost, however, is going to support the war. He contended that man is working more for the government than for himself and he expressed the hope that economy will be instituted so that a man can keep some of the fruits of his labor in his own pocket to spend as he pleases. Salaries of government employees are not too high, but there are too many employees and the government is supporting many agencies that could well be abolished.

"Huey Long was a piper compared to the amount of taxes we are having to pay today," he said and "this idea of spending everything we make above a bare living must stop when this war ends.

A sound banking system was advocated to stabilize world trade after the war. "When the last World War was over we built up a high tariff wall against the trade of other nations, built big surpluses in this country and as a consequence the depression fell on us like an avalanche. We'll have better sense this time and do some wise planning for future stability and prosperity."

He praised the laboring people and the farmers for producing the materials of war and food in sufficient quantities not only to feed ourselves but our allied countries that are fighting alongside us and predicted that the final push for victory and peace in Europe is coming closer every day.

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Trucks Will Get More Horsepower

While the war has pigeon-holed many improvements in motor truck, new designs the industry has developed for military purposes may achieve popularity in the post war period, according to a survey. "Your Progress in Commercial Motor Vehicles," now being distributed by the Military Vehicle Division of the Automotive Council for War Production.

The book, written by Athel F. Denham, points out that the wartime increase in the production of high octane gasoline may likewise cause an increase in the engine compression ratios of trucks, in order to take advantage of the higher antiknock qualities of the new fuels.

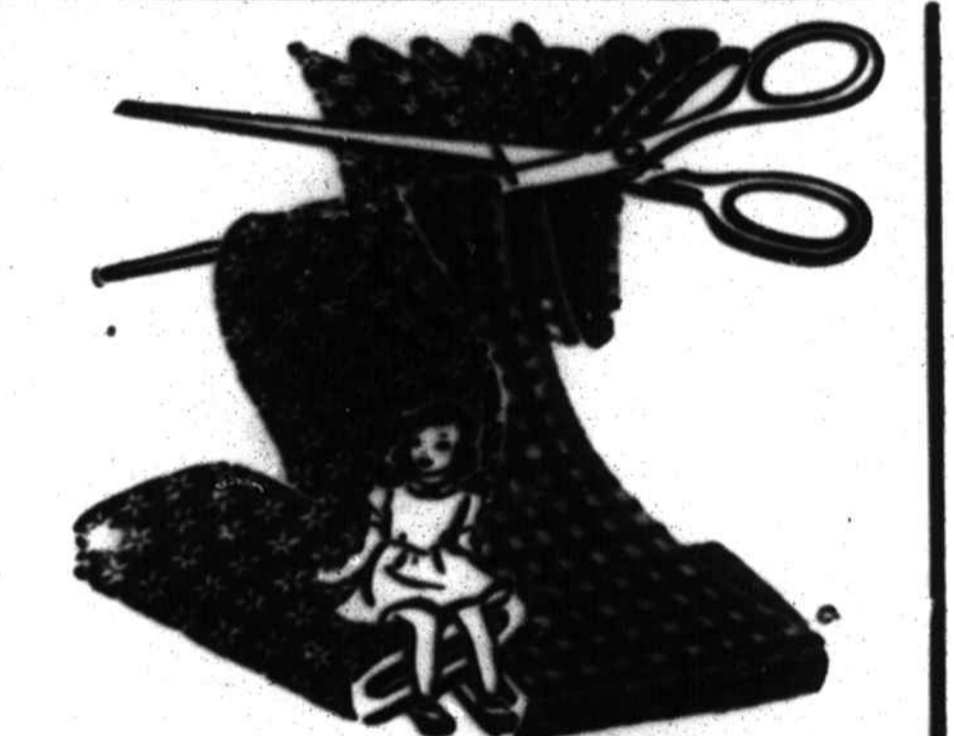
