**IRAMAN WALKER COMMENDED**

Charlotte, N. C., April 25.—Four Bluejackets — two from Georgia and two from North Carolina — have been commended for outstanding service as members of the Armed Guard Unit aboard the SS JAMES WOODROW during action against enemy aircraft at Salerno, Italy, Sept. 11 to 17, 1943.

Among the men commended is Seaman First Class Stenwall Walker of Kings Mountain. Seaman Walker, 27 years old, is the son of James W. Walker. He entered the service at Raleigh in October, 1942.

The letters of commendation to the four men said:

"A report of the experience reveals that your ship and the areas about her were subjected to repeated bombing attacks throughout the six-day period. In spite of the danger from falling bombs, shrapnel, and machine gun fire the Navy Gun crew remained at battle stations day and night bravely striking back at the enemy with a sustained and accurate barrage of shellfire which contributed to the destruction of four German planes. The courageous and effective defense of your ship enabled her to carry out her appointed mission in the invasion operation."

"The quality of your performance in the above action was in keeping with the best traditions of the United States Naval Service."

"A copy of the letter has been made a part of your official record in the Bureau."
