

Great Improvements In Sweet Potatoes

More certified sweet potato stocks were tested this spring and more farmers treated their potatoes at heading with a disinfecting solution than ever before in the history of the crop in North Carolina, reports Johnny Lassiter, Extension horticulturist at State College.

"If this good work continues to spread, Eastern Carolina can easily develop another excellent cash crop. When the farmers used a disinfecting solution of 1 pound of Neomycin 100 to 7 1/2 gallons of water before heading to prevent the spread of surface-borne disease, they took a big step forward in producing sweet potatoes of better quality," Lassiter pointed out.

More work on growing larger yields of potatoes and improving the quality and flavor of the crop is being done in 1944 than at any other previous time. Demonstrations in time of planting and in spring are being conducted. The various of slips, or stems, versus the cuttings are to be tested. Fertilizer demonstrations with various amounts of 100 per acre are being placed.

The Experiment Station tests have

shown that the addition of borax to the regular fertilizer improves the quality and helps to prevent growth cracks in sweet potatoes. Demonstrations, using 10 pounds of borax per acre along with the regular fertilizer are being conducted at various points.

"Sweet potatoes should be grown on sandy or sandy loam soils," says Lassiter, "because these soils produce potatoes of the finest quality. Heavy soils, dark soils, and rich garden soils produce potatoes of poor market quality."

Cockroaches Killed By Sodium Fluoride

Sodium fluoride has been recommended for cockroach control for many years and is still the most effective material available for this purpose, says J. Myron Maxwell, Extension entomologist at N. C. State College.

The effectiveness of the sodium fluoride treatment depends upon the method of application. Maxwell recommends that the powder be dusted very thinly over the surfaces where the cockroaches may run through it. The pests lick the material which sticks to their feet and thus they are poisoned. If the powder is left in piles, the cockroach will avoid walking through it.

A small garden duster may be used for applying the sodium fluoride. If a duster is not available, Maxwell recommends that about 1-4 teaspoonful of powder be placed in the center of a piece of cloth about 12 by 18 inches. Sift the powder thru the cloth by striking with a stick.

The powder should be applied around baseboards, under the kitchen sink, and on cabinet shelves. It is not effective when applied to wet surfaces. The material acts rather slowly but in about five days many dead cockroaches should be found.

"Sodium fluoride is poisonous, but there is little or no danger of the cockroaches carrying sufficient sodium fluoride to any food product to be harmful for human consumption. It should not be sifted directly on any food product which is to be eaten," Maxwell says.

Need Tax Incentives For Business Growth

Wise governmental policies, including establishment of tax incentives for risk-taking ventures, will be essential if industry is to succeed in providing a satisfactory level of employment after the war, according to Wilfred Sykes, president of Inland Steel Co., Chicago.

Citing his own company's growth, within 20 years, from its original investment of \$50,000, part of which was borrowed, to its present investment of close to \$200,000,000, Mr. Sykes said that such growth of small enterprises will be impossible after the war unless tax exemptions be provided for money plowed back into the business in the form of job-creating facilities or for future use.

Such incentive taxation is vital not only for small business but for an expanding economy as a whole, Mr. Sykes added.
