Throughout his artistic life Lanier was true to the loftiest ideals. He did not separate artistic from moral beauty. To his sensitive spirit, the beauty of holiness and the halo of beauty seemed interchangeable terms.

"I know not how I can express it. The music sets my world ablaze, and melts my passions into a sea of satisfying symphonies."

So wrote Lanier of Beethoven, whom he called the "triumph of the weak, the strong; the triumph of love

and strife, the triumph of the whole of life, at whose great coming I trembled the perfect tone of sun."

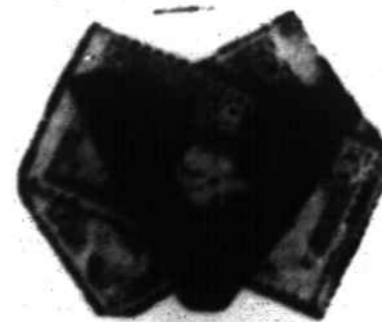
