M. has took it so can I have been in the army four months today I have a baby girl I have seen it once. But I hope to see my family the last of August, then I'll be ready for overseas. I know that all the people are praying for all the service men. Well, they sure do need it.

All we can do is to go to the show. The people are here about the show in some places we go as free. I think that all shows ought to be free to service men and women because of their run out and see a show and get their mind off of the things that bother them, that is what they need. If we go through all the hell we go to help to make this a free world the people all over the U. S. A. ought to help show the service boys and girls a good time for a while. I will be shipped to the front but one of my wishes is to go to the front to help all the other boys from K. M. win this war, so I will say so long for a while. Yours truly,

We all want our country to always be free and we all want to hurry and get home. So we can be with our loved ones, and if the people at home will keep on praying and keep the supplies rolling to the boys that are using them, we will soon be home again. We want the people to pray especially for those boys that are over there now for they are the ones that are doing the work and bringing victory nearer. So all you people keep up the good work and pray a lot I want to say hello to my wife and son and also my family. I will have to close for this time. So go on guard. Keep the Herald coming this way.

Dear Mr. Lynch:  
I am sitting here on my hospital bed tonight reading a letter from my cousin, J. E. Hullebender and also some clippings from the Kings Mountain Herald that he sent me. I enjoy both very much.  
The clippings are the first that I have had since coming into the service. How you can guess how I must feel about them.  
I am now on one of those beautiful southern islands that you people back there hear so much about these days. Well, in fact I have been down this way for a long time.  
You people hear so much about these islands being so beautiful. Well they would be unless different conditions existed. I have been in them so long that I have become used to them. Some are O. K. others are not.  
The first islands are the most beautiful of them all that I visited yet. I will show you a few pictures. From these I noticed in a letter from John Hullebender that you people back there are eating coconuts. Now if he likes them he should be on this island he could get millions of them.  
I was sitting in my tent one long ago and heard a noise and would you believe it 17 coconuts fell on the tent and most of them came in side around my feet. If one should hit you it would be just too hot.

I heard on the radio today that a hurricane hit the coast of N. C. I sure hope it was not as bad as one that I was in a good while ago. I thought for about 36 hours that every thing would be blown away. Here had a tough time. Can't say much about this place only that there is plenty of rain here and we sure do have some nice mud.  
I have worked on trucks in mud here deep. Oh yes, I wear boots to the mud.  
You never hear much about the Ord. Well, they are the men who keep the Army moving. If it was not for them the Army would be stuck. You never see anything about the Ord. in the papers. They get no credit for what they do, yet they are the backbone of the Army. We work day and night to keep the trucks and other equipment on the move. We work rain or shine in the mud or anywhere. We don't mind it as long as things keep moving. We work under any conditions regardless of what happens.  
I have been in the hospital for over two weeks and was confined to bed for about ten days before being sent here. I feel much better now and hope to be back at work soon. Well, I guess I had better close this chatter for this time so as to have something to say in my next letter. That is if I get a chance to write again any way. See you long and keep up the good work back there.
