3,500,000 FEDERAL CIVIL
EMPLOYEES ON YOUR
PAYROLL

There are today more than 3,500,000
employees on the payroll of the
Federal Government - more
people than there are in the entire state
of Georgia. Of these 3,500,000 em-
ployees, over 2,735,000 have
been added to the roll since March, 1933.

It is no secret, for example, that
in the fiscal year 1941 the total non-
military travel bill of federal depart-
ments and agencies was \$67,309,210.

Citing a report of the Byrd Com-
mittee, Mr. Sullivan gives a graphic
picture of the magnitude of Federal
civil employment by comparing it
with similar employment by the
states.

It is obvious that the people of the
United States can not long bear the
burden of this top-heavy bureaucracy.

It is not our purpose to condemn
out of hand each and every Federal
agency, nor to indicate that their
employees are, by and large,
parasites on the body politic.

It is our purpose to call attention
to this cancerous growth in our
government, this bureaucracy that has,
indeed, run amok, and to call on the
American people to do the surgical
work that is necessary to save our
country from its paralytic effort.
