RANDOM NOTES

A news story recently released by the press has come to my hands. This story was sent home by Pfc. Curtis Henderson, who was wounded in France on Aug. 5th. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Henderson of Kings Mountain and was on maneuvers in the Carolina in '42. Pfc. Henderson says there are several men from this section in this famous division and the whereabouts have been kept secret for two years.

Except for the news story read: "It can now be told for the first time that this best-trained Armored Division in history spearheaded the American invasion of French Morocco and its three-day conquest in November, 1942 and just a year ago this month smashed across Sicily to cut the island in half and isolated and captured thousands of Italian and German prisoners."

"Most of the veterans of these two previous amphibious operations were still in the division when General Bradley again took it off the maps less than a week ago and sent it into battle line with orders to crash through the 'Unbreakable' German Mt. Lo-Lessay defense line."

"And they have come through gloriously for the third time—just as they did in Morocco, just as they did at Palermo—and just as those 'Hell on Wheels' boys always do when the chips are down."

"The 2nd Armored Division has always had a tradition of fighting men and fighting commanders since it was activated on July 15, 1940, at Fort Benning, Ga., one month after the fall of France, as one of the two original Armored Divisions."

"On its several campaigns, it has lost known to the public a Lt. Col. George B. Patton, Jr. who led it from Bay Pigeon to the sea, and who regarded it as the foremost fighting force in the American Army and toughest and best Armored Division in any army. He wanted his tankmen to be tough and he did this by being tough on them, subjecting them to repeated grilling maneuvers."

"When, as commander of the Western Task Force, Patton called upon them to invade the French coast, they stood true to their training. They landed at Port Lyautey, Fedala and Saffi. Those at Port Lyautey worked with Navy dive bombers to knock out 24 of 32 attacking French tanks. Those at Saffi flung back a counter attack from the mountain resort town of Marrakech, and converged on Casablanca as the armistice was being signed."

Hal Olive's mother after weeks of waiting has received two or three letters from him. Hal, writing from the S. Pacific area describes the natives of his present habitat. "Medium size, bushy black hair. About the only clothing they wear is a cloth around their hips. Most of them wear ear rings and some I haven't seen them yet have rings in their noses. A few speak pretty good English, but the majority speak a mixture of English, their native tongue, German, Portuguese, etc."

Clara Warlick, Jr., who with several other Kings Mountain boys completed her last training at Camp Peary, Va., also came home last week for a visit to layish in his praise of the wonderful service rendered by the U. S. G. He says during their stay in Hanville, Va., they were treated to omelets, sandwiches and doughnuts.
