CAIRO, EGYPT.—The unhappy fate of an Iranian (Persian) pilgrim who became ill at Islam's holiest altar, "Kaba," at Mecca, where the prophet Mohammed performed sacrifices, raised a first class diplomatic incident in the Arab world.
Why the Persian was sick remained undisclosed, but the immediate result was his decapitation at the orders of King Ibn Saud, guardian of the shrine.
The Saudi's action has drawn protest from the Iran government, both to him and to the Egyptian government, which functions as "guardian of the pilgrimage" this year.
