

Otto C. Kiser, Jr., Leads In War Bond Drive

An Eighth Air Force Fighter Station, England—Otto C. Kiser, Jr., son of Otto C. Kiser, Sr., of route 2, Kings Mountain, N. C., is one of the war bond purchasers who helped his P-51 Mustang station reach a record-breaking total of \$111,000 in the Eighth Air Force "Victory Bond and Stamp" drive, surpassing all other groups in the Eighth Fighter Command.

Aiming at an original goal of \$50,000, he and his fellow soldiers, members of the fighter group, commanded by Col. Harold J. Rau, of Hampstead, N. Y.—more than doubled that figure in a five-week all-out bond drive. The money will go to wards the purchase of a new Squadron of airplanes, bought entirely by personnel of the Eighth Air Force.

Cpl. Kiser, an aircraft armorer, has been overseas for 11 months.

Spur Risk Capital Industrialists Ask

Risk capital must be encouraged if the nation is to avoid postwar inflation, according to the consensus of 17 leading industrialists revealed in a recent poll of the life insurance companies in America.

Some business men questioned advanced price controls for a "reasonable period," or until supply approximated demand, but expressions such as "later taxes to encourage new capital investment," "encouragement of investment," "tax policy that will encourage business to expand" and "removal of the present discrimination against risk capital" appeared in nearly every answer.

Plan Production Of Postwar Cars

Nash Motors division of the Nash-Kelvinator Corp. has been authorized by the War Production Board to engage in limited preparatory work in constructing experimental models of civilian passenger cars. It was a great that no civilian passenger would be undertaken that would interfere with the company's war work and the workers involved will be limited to planning engineers and technicians.

Fuel Oil Fighting For Victory

The start of the heating season was moved up to Sept. 1 this year in order to spread the demand for oil more evenly throughout the year. From now until December, when the weather usually starts, families are urged to be particularly careful of the amount they use because carelessness now may mean the difference between a reasonably warm or a chilly home later in the winter.

Families living in rural homes and others who use oil stoves or kerosene heaters face as big a problem in fuel oil rationing as owners of central heating plants. The demand for kerosene for space heating has been reduced under rationing during the past two years but it had not been cut enough to meet increased war demands. It is imperative that kerosene use be cut to the absolute minimum needed to maintain health and consumers must use their rations carefully to conserve as much as possible this year. There are many ways to help maintain comfort during the winter. It is every one's responsibility to the use of his ration allotment, never should suffer hardship this winter.

Military requirements for kerosene are continuously increasing as the European and Pacific theaters are stepped up.

At the same time, civilian requirements for kerosene for war production and other essential industrial uses and for cooking and lighting are much greater than before the war. All these facts point to a serious kerosene supply problem for 1945, therefore use YOUR supply very carefully.

Due to the critical shortage of fuel oil, people who have not been heating with oil before are not eligible for a fuel oil ration to heat this year.

Before buying a used or new oil stove consult your local Rationing Board to find out if you are eligible for a fuel oil ration.

New OIL HEATING and cooking stoves are still rationed, but coal and wood heating and cooking stoves were removed from rationing on October 15, 1944.
